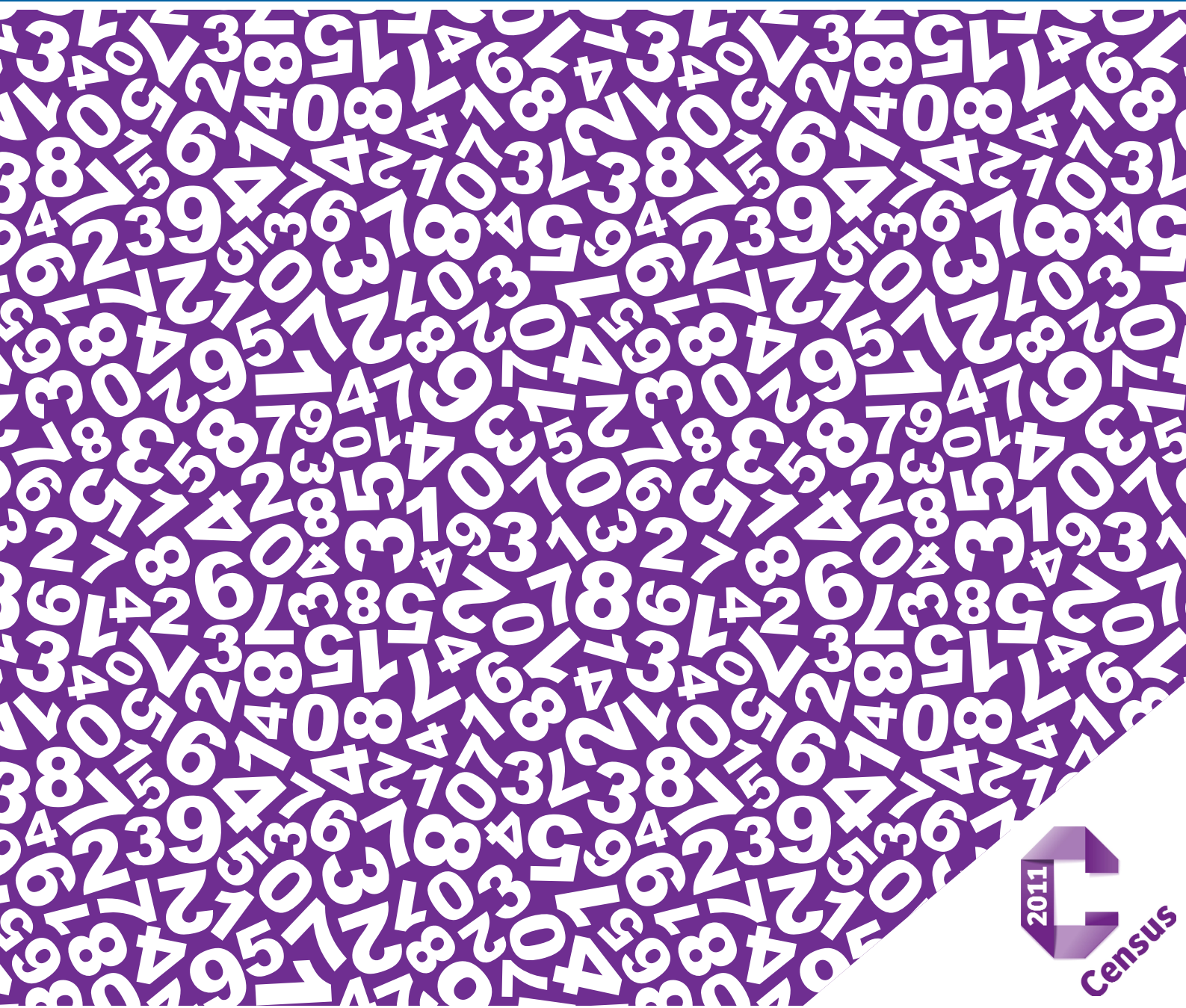

2011 Census Consortium

Plans for the 2011 Census Consortium are now going through the formal procedures after much discussion at the Census Users' Group meetings. There are various different steps involved and these are explained below. The final drafts of the papers will be circulated to boroughs very soon.

Mayoral Approval

The first stage in the process for the new Census Consortium is to get Mayoral Approval. This requires comments from finance, legal and the Mayor's approval before it can then go on to formal consultation with the boroughs. As soon as it has Mayoral Approval a copy of the proposed Information Scheme and the detailed Schedule will be sent to all borough Census Contacts. The papers are currently with the Mayor's Office for approval.

Consultation on proposal

Formal consultation with the boroughs is the next step. This involves the previous discussions at the Census Users' Group, a paper to the London Councils Chief Executives' Committee and a further (or the same) paper to the London Councils Leaders' Committee. We expect both of these to happen in December. These papers ask the boroughs for the proposed Information Scheme to be put to them, it does not involve any commitment at this stage.

Agreements with functional bodies

Meanwhile, discussions will take place with the functional bodies about the GLA group share of the costs.

Information Scheme

If all goes well through the earlier stages then a formal Information Scheme proposal will be sent to each individual borough for their agreement. If we then get 22 signed agreements back (two-thirds of the boroughs) the arrangement becomes legally binding on the GLA and all of the boroughs. We will keep everyone updated on the progress of the Information Scheme.

Borough Census Contacts are likely to be asked to provide some internal briefings on these proposals. To help with this we will shortly send out some notes on how we think the boroughs will benefit from this arrangement. It is then up to each individual borough to decide for themselves how they will brief within their own borough.

2011 Census Output Consultation

There will be a further and final round of consultation on output from the 2011 Census. This was due to happen this autumn but is now scheduled to take place in the new year and will be linked with a series of roadshows. There is no news yet on dates for these.

We have supported the development of workplace zones and have been involved in the Workplace Zones User Group for some time now. This group has not met for quite a long time but there is a meeting scheduled for 3rd December at City Hall. One of the main topics for discussion will be the tabulations required. If anyone has any particular requirements for workplace based data please let us know what they are.

There is a new head of output at ONS. Denise McGregor is at ONS on a two year secondment from Statistics New Zealand.

2011 Census Geography Consultation

There has been no formal announcement so far on the geography for the 2011 Census but we expect there to be two standard geographies, the statistical geography based on Output Areas and Super Output Areas and the administrative geography based on electoral wards. It seems likely that the administrative geography will be on a best fit basis because of disclosure control requirements but this will not be a problem in London because the ward boundaries will not have changed since 2002. This may also be discussed at the 2011 Roadshows.

2011 Census Recruitment

Area managers have now started work and bulk recruitment for census collectors started on 20th September. David Dunn of Capita attended the Census Users' Group meeting of 8th September to discuss how the boroughs can help with recruitment. At this stage recruitment appears to be going well.

2011 Census Methodology

ONS are running a series of methodology tutorials with two being held in London. The dates for these are 22nd and 30th November. Bookings for these are directly with ONS.

ONS have set up an independent review of the estimation methodology which is currently under way. Boroughs are asked to put any comments they have to ONS via London Councils. Liam McKay is the contact at London Councils.

London Census Forum

The London Census Forum has been set up on the Communities of Practice website. We have had some discussion about the purpose of this and from our point of view the main purpose is for members of the Census Consortium to discuss issues with each other if they want to. We will obviously participate but it will not be the only place where things are discussed. We are likely to raise issues where we are lobbying ONS or negotiating with them about what we want and therefore feel that this is not appropriate for ONS and others not involved in the consortium to become members. We would encourage you all to apply to join not only the London Census Forum but also the general ONS forum on 2011 Census issues. That is the place to ask questions directly of ONS.

SASPAC v9.25 update

SASPAC v9.25 was released back in August this year and the update files can be found here:

This is not a packaged installation and users will need to follow the published guidance on updating from v9.0 (9.05/9.06 or 9.07) to v9.25. Since its release some users have experienced problems accessing the NeSS Data Exchange (NDE) Web service. Following investigations by the SASPAC team and colleagues at ONS who support the NDE service, this error has been identified as caused by a conflict between the user's proxy server (handles requests between your PC and other services e.g. web page) and the code SASPAC uses to call the NDE service. We are currently working on a solution and will roll this out to users as soon as possible. If you require any further information, please contact the helpdesk.

During the last five months, SASPAC have undertaken a competitive re-tendering process for its Support and Development services. This process is almost complete and will result in a pool of suppliers to enable SASPAC to develop and deliver its 2011 Census (and other data) services.

Training

Provision of training is currently provided on an ad hoc basis for users. Training in SASPAC and the Census will continue but has been reduced in frequency until we get a bit nearer to the peak of activity at the time of the 2011 Census. If anyone has staff turnover and needs someone trained in the interim please contact any member of the Census or SASPAC Teams.

Census Users' Group Meetings

Meetings are usually held quarterly. The minutes of the meetings held on 9th June and 26th October 2010 are in Appendix 1. There were no minutes for the September meeting as this consisted of two presentations, one from Owen Abbott from ONS about the 2011 Census edit, imputation and quality procedures and David Dunn from Capita about the bulk recruitment which started on 20th September. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday 14th December 2010 at 2pm in Committee Room 2 at City Hall.

Minutes of Census Users Group Meeting, 9th June 2010

Presentation by Jude-Martin Etuka from Capita

Jude-Martin Etuka, (JME) head of Diversity at Capita spoke to the group about how Capita were planning to deliver a representative workforce amongst the 35,000 people who would be employed in the 2011 Census. As a large recruitment exercise, a representative workforce would not only be best practise, but a legal requirement.

Recruitment of the high volume census roles would commence in September and Capita were looking for boroughs' assistance in publicising this amongst their employees. Some groups of employees, for example electoral canvassers, were likely to be particularly skilled in the enumeration and collection roles. Boroughs were encouraged to publicise the census on websites, newsletters and other publications.

JME said that the procedures used by Capita should facilitate a representative workforce. Any attempt to impose quotas for example for local people would detract from the fairness of the system. Michelle Von Ahn stressed the value of using local people for local Census jobs and asked if they would be given some priority in the recruitment process. She commented that this had not been the case for the Census rehearsal in Newham. JME replied that although Capita would try to recruit local people, it would not be policy to give them priority over other candidates.

For the rehearsal, MVA had sent Capita information on local groups in Newham that could provide a source of workers from minority groups. However she understood that Capita had not used it. For the 2010 recruitment it was expected that the majority of candidates for census jobs would come via Jobcentre Plus due to the large numbers required. Many local authority employees would be likely to have good knowledge of their local geography and communities but would find it hard to apply for Census roles as most of these were full-time posts. It was thought that ONS might re-consider the balance of full and part-time posts offered.

More generally, JME was asked if Capita would ensure that enumerators in hard-to-count areas were, where possible, selected from local communities. He replied that decisions about how to deploy field staff would rest with Area Managers in the light of the skills of the people available. Capita were asked for information on what media would be used to target local communities and hard to reach groups so that boroughs could co-ordinate their activity. JME replied that ONS had contracted Linstock Communications to contact special and community groups and these questions should be put to ONS.

MVA asked if Capita had to deal solely with ACLMs in boroughs when it might be more appropriate to talk directly to communications or community teams. Capita had asked for a list

of local and community organisations within each borough, but the leads supplied had been of variable quality. Boroughs might have supplied better information if it had been explained what the contacts would be used for. It was agreed that communications between Capita, ONS and boroughs could be improved.

It was suggested that a meeting specifically for A/CLMS would be beneficial. Such a meeting could be arranged within the Census Users Group network, but it might be more appropriate for Barry Quirk to lead.

1. Minutes of the last meeting and matters arising

No comments had been received on the minutes of the previous meeting. Matters arising were dealt with under agenda topics.

2. 2011 Census Issues

Output and Geography Consultations EH had responded to the output consultation on behalf of the GLA and AL had responded to the geography consultation. Both responses had been circulated to group members.

London Regional Select Committee The full report 'London's Population and the 2011 Census' was published on 31 March 2010. It included written evidence, transcripts of oral sessions and final recommendations. The report can be found here:

Workplace Zones The group had not met again as the chair of the group, Ian Coady had been ill. There was no further information on progress of the pilots.

Rehearsal Evaluation Michelle von Ahn highlighted two issues from the rehearsal evaluation: first there had been some differences in ethnic groups' response rates observed in Newham, White groups had higher response rates than average, Asian groups had lower rates. Secondly the evaluation reported over two per cent of forms returned as undeliverable by the Post Office but no analysis of the reasons for this, so that it was not possible to estimate how many addresses the Post Office had missed in the delivery process.

3. 2011 Census Consortium and Information Scheme: specification of proposed work

EH outlined the timetable for progressing the Information Scheme: Mayoral approval for the Scheme would be sought over the summer then papers would be put to the London Councils Leaders' and Chief Executives' Committees. The Information Scheme Schedule would be finalised by December, and a draft had been sent out to borough contacts. She invited comments on this, and in particular what work should be included in it. Previous legal advice had been that the wording could allow some flexibility for the group to decide precise outputs in the light of the consortium's future priorities.

MVA said that it would be useful to see administrative data compared with census data

possibly at pan-London or sub-regional levels. This would complement boroughs' own work validating census results.

On wider membership of the Consortium, EH said that discussions would take place with the functional bodies shortly. It might also be desirable to invite participation from a few other organisations.

4. SASPAC update

AL demonstrated SASPAC 9.25 a version capable of querying external online datasets. The priority is now to develop SASPAC to consume ONS' 2011 beta API (Application Programming Interface), which is expected to become available in autumn 2010. An advantage of this technical approach is that SASPAC could allow its users to search/query datasets from a variety of sources and not just Census. In answer to questions, AL said that it was anticipated that much of the 2011 Census data would be delivered on-line to SASPAC and that SASPAC would continue to work with historic system files. SASPAC would, in fact, provide our only access to a lot of the earlier census data.

As current developments to SASPAC were mainly small it was not expected that there would be a full release and distribution over the next few months. Any user who wanted a copy of version 9.25 should contact the helpdesk for the update files.

The new SASPAC website had been set up at <http://saspac.wordpress.com/> AL said it would provide more flexible presentation than the existing site. He was currently transferring content from the old site and once this had been done he would change the saspac.org name to point at the new site.

5. Training update

AL reported that a few boroughs had received training at the sessions held recently. If any further training needs arose please contact the Census team.

6. Paycheck Consortium

A final tranche of data should be delivered by CACI under the existing agreement. Based on previous years this was anticipated around July. Existing subscribers would receive these data without making any further payment. The agreement expires in December and if it is not renewed all data that members hold will have to be deleted after that date. Richard Walker in the Social Exclusion Team now leads on Paycheck for GLA and is investigating sources of small area income data. Future discussions will be conducted in the Social Exclusion Data Users Group.

7. Any other Business

A BSPS day meeting on the demography of London would be held at City Hall on 7 July. The morning sessions would concentrate on historical work whilst the afternoon would be on current issues. Booking was via the BSPS website.

Robin Hall was retiring and this would be his last Census User Group meeting. The group thanked Robin for his support over the years.

Minutes of Census Users Group Meeting, 26th October 2010

1. Minutes of the last meeting and matters arising

There were no minutes of the meeting on 9 September as this meeting comprised presentations by ONS and Capita only. The minutes from the previous meeting on 9th June were accepted.

2. 2011 Census Issues

Recruitment update (Nick O'Donnell sent this report after the meeting):

Recruitment in London is going to plan, with up to three phases of activity for each role allowing us to focus resources in later phases on those areas with fewer applications. The extension of most London Co-ordinator posts to 7 November and Special Enumerator posts to 14 November is the second phase of the plan, and is in line with expectations. Some co-ordinator roles may be advertised after 7 November as Capita go into Phase 3, similarly special enumerators are being advertised as part of Phase 2- despite receiving far in excess of the anticipated application numbers for this role.

If any posts fail to attract sufficient numbers and calibre of applications by the end of phase three (18 November for Co-ordinators and 5 December for Special Enumerators), there is a possibility of extending them further.

The latest figures for London were 4,600 applications for 444 co-ordinator roles, and 3,000 applications for 86 special enumerators (the highest ratio of applications to posts of any region). It was too early to give any indication of progress on Collector roles.

Sue Kaminska said that a colleague had complained that the online application process made it impossible for local government employees to apply for posts as there was a period of two weeks where there was no flexibility in the hours worked. It was agreed that the group should comment formally about the lack of flexibility in the specification of the co-ordinator role.

Borough efforts to reach target groups; completion events Colin Rumsey said that he was awaiting advice on organising events to help people fill in their Census forms: so far ONS had not confirmed that boroughs could put on these events at all. However some other boroughs said that they would run events and that Census Area Managers (CAMs) wanted to assist. Craig Ferguson commented that many events would be run for and by community groups so the boroughs' role would be to assist with events that were organised by other groups.

There was an issue of what help could be offered and by whom. Council helpers could be required to sign confidentiality agreements before the events. Also ONS might want councils to stress that helpers were not acting in any ONS official capacity.

Census Pan-London Partnership Plan Michelle Von Ahn (MVA) said the CAMs in her borough were good at seeking engagement with local communities but co-ordinating efforts with the Community Advisors was difficult because the two groups did not share a local partnership plan. There was agreement that it was not clear what areas were covered by the Community

Advisors so co-ordination was difficult. It was agreed that these concerns should be passed on to ONS and information sought on the location of community advisors in London: a map would be useful. However some hard to reach groups such as new Eastern European migrants did not have community advisors. Alistair Smith (AS) commented that completion events could work well where communities had established centres such as mosques or social clubs but groups such as recent migrants and young people would be more difficult to contact.

More general methods of contact that were considered by some boroughs included a mailshot promoting the Census to be sent out with council tax bills or other householders communication. It was not clear however if such an approach was permitted. Another route was to use in-house magazines for stories about the Census in the build-up to census day. An issue here was convincing editors that the Census was newsworthy.

Sue Kaminska (SK) said that local Indian media had shown interest in publicity for the Census and this might be better taken forward on a pan-London basis. She would pass on more information.

Output and geography consultations The second round of consultation due for autumn 2010 had been delayed and would likely now be combined with the round of Census roadshows to be held early in 2011. EH had heard informally that wards are likely to be produced as a standard geography and hence would be available with the main outputs from 2012.

Workplace Zones A meeting was scheduled for early December that would discuss users requirements for outputs on the new geography. It would be difficult to discuss this in detail however as there was still no official policy on disclosure control.

SARS meeting This was scheduled for 8th November but had since been postponed to January 2011. The new date had not been announced.

Census Methodology Tutorials ONS were holding a number of events to brief non-technical Census users on the coverage, estimation and quality assurance methodology to be used in 2012. Dates in London were 22nd and 30th November.

An independent review of the quality assurance and imputation methodology had been commissioned and would report in February 2012. The review will be carried out by a small, largely academic, group.

Address register No further feedback had been received from ONS on the address checking pilots. The main cut from the address list would be taken in November for the main printing of census form address labels. There would be a second, supplementary list taken in February 2012 although exact dates were not known.

3. 2011 Census Consortium progress and timetable

Approval of the Information Scheme within the GLA was progressing and Mayoral approval was expected shortly. The next stage was presentation to the London Leaders meeting on 14th

December. Comments were still welcome on the contents of the Schedule. The Scheme was modelled on that used for the 2001 Census, although legal advice was that the 2011 Scheme should have a fixed ten years' duration, and there should be a review after five years. As with the 2001 Scheme, the purchase of special London tabulations would constitute the largest direct expenditure of the Consortium, but there would likely be software costs (SASPAC or other) and possibly hardware (such as provision of laptops). Doug Ogilvie said that SASPAC remained the best tool for aggregating census data to bespoke areas.

Since the delivery mechanisms for 2011 data were not yet known it was not possible to say how much GLA would need to process data for the consortium; it was likely that more data would be supplied under special license than in 2001 and GLA was discussing arrangements for this with ONS.

AS asked what the cost of the scheme had been in 2001. EH replied that it had been £14 thousand compared to £20 thousand for 2011. MVA said that the scheme represented very good value for money over the ten-year period.

The information scheme would be ratified when 22 boroughs signed up; it would then become binding on all 33. In the absence of agreement from at least 22 boroughs there was no plan for an informal agreement with a smaller group. Milan Ogjenovic asked if it would be possible to set up an agreement at some later time. EH replied that the present was the most appropriate time for an information scheme in terms of commissioning output from the 2011 Census and ensuring continuity from 2001, although there was flexibility on when the payments from boroughs could be taken.

It might be desirable to widen membership of the Consortium as had happened in 2001. EH said that other organisations might be invited to join where appropriate. Discussions with the functional bodies would take place once the Mayor had given formal approval.

It was noted that members would need to brief Chief Executives about the London Councils papers. It was agreed that EH would give more details of the outputs produced from the 2001 scheme that could be passed on to boroughs.

4. SASPAC

ONS would be formally releasing their API in mid-November. Development of SASPAC continued working with this API. Meanwhile the procurement process to secure services for the future development of SASPAC was close to completion.

The current development version of SASPAC, 9.25, has a problem working with proxy servers. Work continues to resolve this.

It was noted that it had been some time since any data had been distributed to users on disk. It was agreed that a consolidated release of data including system files for 1971, 1981 and 1991 would be useful for many people. AL said that future development of SASPAC would look at ways to integrate data across censuses to produce useable time series.

6. Paycheck Consortium

Richard Walker has recently sent 2010 data to consortium members. The existing agreement expires on 17th December and members who do not renew with CACI will have to delete all data that they hold after that date. Groups of boroughs could come together to jointly purchase data but a London-wide consortium was unlikely to be feasible due to the need for purchases of over £50 thousand to go to European tender. (The cost of Paycheck was thought to be around £1,500 a year for each borough).

7. Any other Business

Christine Cook asked if anyone had used the ONS census countdown widget as it was too large to fit on the Wandsworth (and other) websites.

MVA said that the UK Statistics Agency was currently assessing how well ONS demography outputs met user needs, (this is one of the criteria for assessment of compliance with National Statistics standards). Users could comment to the UKSA up to 2nd November. Other outputs being assessed included migration, vital events and household projections.
