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foreword



The Census Information Scheme (CIS) for the 2011 Census came into effect on 1st October 2011. The dual intention of this arrangement is to deliver the highest quality, specialised census output for the capital at the same time as ensuring optimum efficiencies and value for money for participating organisations. Beyond this the Census Information Scheme is an opportunity for London boroughs, the Greater London Authority, and its functional bodies to work together to share ideas, information and best practice to the benefit of all consortium members.

In July the Office for National Statistics released the first data from the 2011 Census which showed the capital's population has grown to over 8.17 million people.

The first year of the CIS has been a busy one. In addition to the training days, Census User Group meetings and consultation events the team at the GLA have begun to develop a census hub on the London Datastore and have produced a series of data visualisations, reports and briefing notes to help members access and understand the Census.

November 2012 will see subsequent releases of more detailed, interesting and informative datasets that will help us to better understand and provide for the population of London.

We are looking forward to continuing this successful collaboration with all the members as we collectively make the most of the rich detail about London's population available from the Census.

introduction

The Census Information Scheme (CIS) is a consortium of 33 London local authorities, the GLA and its functional bodies. It provides London-specific expert analysis of census data and represents the interests of members in discussions with the Office for National Statistics (ONS). The CIS also acts as a forum where members can discuss census issues and share best practice.

All boroughs were invited to sign up to the Census Information Scheme in January 2011. The GLA Act 1999, section 397, states that once a two-thirds majority of local authorities sign up for the CIS, it becomes mandatory for the remaining ones to join the Scheme. The Authority received 22 signed contracts from local authorities and the Scheme commenced on 1 October 2011. It will run until 2021, at a total cost of £20,000 to each local authority.

Greater London Authority Act (1999)

Section 397: Information schemes

(1) The Mayor may make schemes for the collection of information relating to any matters concerning Greater London or any part of it.

(2) The schemes that may be made under this section include schemes under which each London local authority must provide to the Mayor, in accordance with the scheme, information—

(a) required by the Mayor to be provided; and

(b) falling within such description of information as is specified in the scheme.

(3) A scheme under this section may be made only after consultation with each London local authority.

(4) A scheme under this section shall have effect so as to be binding on all the London local authorities only if at least two-thirds of those authorities give their agreement to the scheme.

(5) A scheme under this section shall state whether or not it is to remain in effect indefinitely and, if it is not to remain in effect indefinitely, shall state the period for which it is to remain in effect.

(6) A scheme under this section may include provision relating to—

(a) the method by which information to be collected or provided under the scheme is to be analysed;

(b) the form in which such information is to be collected or provided;

(c) the ownership of information collected or provided under the scheme;

(d) the method by which information is to be transferred or stored under the scheme;

(e) the persons to whom information collected or provided under the scheme may, or must not, be disclosed;

(f) bearing the costs of the scheme.

(7) The provision which may be made by virtue of subsection (6)(f) above includes in particular provision—

(a) for the costs of collecting or providing information of a description specified in the scheme to be borne by the Mayor or a London local authority or by both the Mayor and a London local authority in such proportions as may be specified by or under the scheme;

(b) for the recovery of costs related to the scheme by the Mayor from a London local authority, by a London local authority from the Mayor or by a London local authority from another such authority.

(8) A scheme under this section may contain such supplementary provision as the Mayor considers necessary or expedient.

(9) The powers of the Mayor under this section are without prejudice to any other power of the Mayor under or by virtue of this Act to require any London local authority to provide information.

(10) For the purposes of this section “London local authority” means a London borough council or the Common Council.

CIS schedule

The CIS schedule, which accompanies the signed contract, lays out what member organisations can expect from the CIS.

The Services to be provided by the CIS are:

- Support and advice – telephone support provided as well as by other means
- Training in software and other census issues – initially three person days training per borough per year
- Representation in negotiations and discussions with ONS on London's data needs
- Census Users Group meetings - quarterly
- Census Information Notes - quarterly
- GLA Census Website/KHub forum or equivalent. Website to contain a wide range of content and functionality including census FAQs; latest news; forum; analysis; CINs; presentations/slides; contacts; data; publications etc
- Seminars on specific topics – two a year
- Analysis – analytical reports similar to those produced from the 2001 Census. The content or topics to be discussed with boroughs and agreed at Census Users' Group meetings. A list of 2001 Census related reports (not necessarily comprehensive) is attached.

This list is not exhaustive particularly in light of rapidly changing needs amongst member organisations. As a result the Scheme has adapted over the last year. The section on **review of service** covers this in greater detail.

review of service

In May 2011 Baljit Bains (Demography & Policy Analysis Manager) took over as service lead. Shortly after, a series of meetings were held at City Hall with members to discuss CIS user requirements and to develop the objectives of the Scheme prior to its launch in October. Five meetings were held; four were attended by representatives of London boroughs while the remaining session was for representatives of the GLA's functional bodies.

GLA functional body meeting was held on 28 November 2011 and was attended by the Metropolitan Police Authority, TfL and LFEPA. Although the formal review meetings are no longer held, members are encouraged to feedback comments and suggestions on an ongoing basis.



The main recommendations from these meetings were:

- Priority commentaries to include: ethnicity, religion, disability, population, commuting, languages spoken and profiles of new migrants such as Eastern Europeans
- GLA should continue to provide a specially commissioned tables service and consult boroughs on requirements
- GLA to develop data dashboards and data visualisations tools
- Provide information on the comparability of 2011 to 2001 census outputs
- Analytical publications to incorporate impacts of policy changes where possible
- GLA assistance in responses to ONS consultations is particularly valuable
- Local data is increasingly important

Training

- Future training should look at alternative delivery mechanisms such as online video training sessions, webinars
- Online forums for Census and SASPAC would be useful
- Training that included a focus on analytical skills as well as making best possible and creative use of data
- Introductory, technical and definitional training would assist many who are new to the area of Census

Communications

- Improve communication channels to ensure boroughs are kept informed of Census developments
- Increase use of Communities of Practice (since changed to Knowledge Hub)
- Provide discussion groups on specific topics
- Produce a CIS annual report
- Develop further networking opportunities for members
- Encourage members presentations at CUG meetings highlighting local issues or analysis
- Consider combining CUG and Demography Liaison Group into one meeting

events

Census User Group meetings

The Census User Group meets up to four times a year. These meetings are an opportunity for the CIS to present their recent work to members and to update members on news and issues relating to the Census. The meetings are also an opportunity for members to raise any queries or concerns they have and to take part in discussions with colleagues in other authorities on Census issues. The CIS held four Census User Group meetings in its first year with the first held two weeks prior to the CIS being formally established:

- 4 April 2012
- 19 July 2012

Meetings are well attended and all members are encouraged to send a representative. The papers, presentations and reports from the CUG meetings are all available on the Knowledge Hub for users to access. The community is private but open to any officers employed by member organisations. The website is <https://knowledgehub.local.gov.uk>.

Commissioned Tables Workshop

The commissioned tables service offered by the ONS allows users to request data which are not included in the standard ONS outputs. The CIS co-ordinates the commissioning of non-standard tables on behalf of member organisations. The cost associated with the production of commissioned tables is paid for by the CIS. On 6th December 2011 the CIS held a Census Workshop at City Hall. The session was attended by 24 officers representing 17

London boroughs, LFEPA, Sutton & Merton PCT and TfL.

The meeting was an opportunity for data users to think about the type of outputs they require from the Census and what data might need to be requested from ONS in the form of commissioned tables should it not be available in the standard output. The feedback gathered from these sessions, along with input collected via the online commissioned tables tool, was and will continue to be used by the GLA to determine the tables which the CIS commissions.

BSPS Annual Conference

Officers from the Demography and Policy Analysis team within the GLA Intelligence Unit attended the 2012 conference of the British Society for Population Studies (BSPS) in Nottingham in September 2012. The conference included a census strand with presentations and discussions on a range of census and census-related topics including quality assurance, estimate development, ONS output plans and Beyond 2011. Glen Watson, ONS 2011 Census Director, provided an interesting and informative review of the 2011 Census operation. A GLA report on the BSPS conference is available on the Knowledge Hub.

ONS Estimation Process Event

In July 2012 the ONS held a day-long event to detail the development of the 2011 Census estimates. The event included information on dual system estimation, the development of the ONS address register and the operation of the various Quality Assurance panels. The information gathered was disseminated to boroughs via the subsequent Census User Group meeting and a condensed London-specific Intelligence Unit briefing (17-2012) was produced.



CIS and ONS Liaison meetings

Currently members of the GLA team represent CIS member interests at the following fora. Papers are shared with members and feedback from these sessions is covered in user group meetings.

training

Review meetings in early 2011 highlighted the variety of training needs across and within consortium member organisations. As a result the CIS has undertaken a programme of training development designed to identify and cater for the census training needs of members.

The CIS schedule, in the section that details the services that will be provided to boroughs, states that each borough is entitled to three person training days per year.

Introduction to Census

In the first year of the CIS demand for training has been significant and the Scheme has offered a number of well-attended half-day introductory courses.

The Introduction to Census workshop aims to provide users with an awareness of the Census dataset, an understanding of census geography and an appreciation of the potential uses of census data in a variety of public sector priority areas such as housing, education, health and adult social care.

The training has successfully been delivered both at City Hall and also on site at member organisations. Feedback has been positive and user comments are used to make further improvements to subsequent workshops. The CIS continues to develop and refine its training materials and to publicise available dates for training.

Future Training

The GLA anticipate that the demand for both the introductory course and more specialised, specific and bespoke training will grow over the coming months. As such the GLA are currently developing more technical and specialised courses.

Consortium members can discuss their training needs with the GLA at census meetings or by calling a member of the team.

SASPAC Training

In addition to census training membership of the consortium also entitles boroughs to training in SASPAC, the software solution for interrogating census datasets.

SASPAC is managed by the GLA on behalf of the Local Government Association (LGA) and the software and associated data are provided to boroughs as part of the consortium. The SASPAC project also promotes the use of census data to organisations in London, and across the UK.

Demand for SASPAC training is directly linked to the release of complex datasets that the software is most useful in accessing. Hence the second, third and fourth releases of 2011 Census data will trigger a programme of SASPAC training.

A training schedule beginning in November 2012 and continuing into 2013 is currently being developed. The SASPAC team intends to offer up to five days per month where individuals can attend a one-day course in the features and uses of SASPAC.

A two-day programme is also being developed which will cover some more detailed features associated with the more complex datasets such as the double geography migration and travel to work data. This course will be available to coincide with the publication of these data towards the end of the ONS release schedule.

data releases

First Release

The 16th July 2012 saw the first release of 2011 Census data. The release comprised rounded population estimates by five-year age band and sex for local authorities in England and Wales. Data on the number of households in local authority areas were also published. Alongside the 2011 Census tables a wealth of supporting information was made available through the 2011 Census Quality Assurance Pack. The pack contained details of the comparator data used by ONS in the quality assurance process as well as details of confidence intervals and response rates.

CIS Products

Following the 16th July release the GLA produced a series of data visualisations hosted on the London Datastore. These included interactive maps, population pyramids, comparative data tools and comparisons to historic census data. The Datastore site also hosted the first release tables and QA data packs on behalf of ONS as an alternative download source should the ONS website struggle with the volume of traffic. These Datastore items were available within a few hours of the 11am release of the data.

In addition to the interactive tools available on the Datastore the CIS has also produced a series of GLA Intelligence updates based on the data provided in the first release. These are as follows:

13-2012 **First Census Results: London boroughs' population by age and sex**

An overview of borough-level population data by age bands, comparisons with other population estimates and projections, an analysis of households with usual residents, of average household size, of non-UK short-term residents by sex, and of residents in households and in communal establishments.

14-2012 **Quality Assurance: London boroughs' response rates**

This briefing presents the person response rates, household response rates and household return rates for the London boroughs and compares these with the response rates for the 2001 Census where available.

17-2012 **Quality Assurance: The estimation process**

Drawing on data released in the Quality Assurance packs as well as ONS methodology papers this briefing provides guidance on the process of producing the 2011 Census estimates. It includes London borough data at each stage of the process.

2011 Census release schedule

The second release of Census data is scheduled for the period November 2012 – February 2013. This release will comprise the **Key Statistics** and **Quick Statistics** tables which are univariate tables providing detail on each of the questions on the Census questionnaire.

The third release scheduled for March 2013 – June 2013 will cover the **Local Characteristics** tables. These are multivariate tables where two or more variables are cross tabulated to provide a greater level of detail. Outputs from some variables will be grouped to produce cell counts large enough to prevent disclosing the characteristics of individuals.

The fourth release, July 2013 – October 2013 will consist of the **Detailed Characteristics** tables. These tables are also multivariate but unlike the Local Characteristics give fuller detail of the variables. In order to maintain anonymity within the data these tables only provide information at ward and Middle layer SOA geographies and higher. The fourth release also includes **Detailed Themes** tables where all pertinent information around a specific theme is grouped as well as the **Armed Forces** tables.

CIS work plan

Following the model developed for the analysis of the first release the CIS intends to produce a series of data visualisations alongside GLA Intelligence briefings for the data contained in subsequent releases. These will include topic-specific reports with commentary detailing the characteristics and distributions of populations. There will also be analysis of change between the new Census dataset and the 2001 output. The timing of these reports is contingent on the ONS release schedule which as yet has not been confirmed in any great detail. CIS members will be updated as ONS release detailed data release schedules. The GLA will also assign publication dates for reports once the ONS release schedule is confirmed. 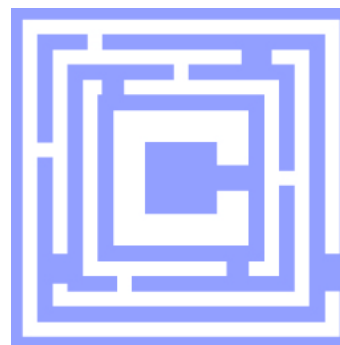

SASPAC update

SASPAC is a software tool for storing, extracting and manipulating complex datasets. It is owned by the Local Government Association and managed by the Greater London Authority. Members of the Census Information Scheme consortium are provided with the software, an organisational licence, census datasets, helpdesk support and training (at City Hall or on location), as part of the consortium agreement.

A new version of SASPAC is currently in development and is scheduled for release in time for the detailed outputs from the 2011 Census. The new version will include an updated interface which users will find more accessible and intuitive while retaining all of the features existing users would expect.

financial reporting

October 2011-September 2012

The CIS budget is ring-fenced for the duration of the Scheme. It is utilised to support the CIS work plan only.

Income

There has been a positive response from members in raising their contributions towards the CIS. Table 1 demonstrates that a single payment (rather than instalments over 2/3/4 years) has been the most popular mode of payment.

Forecast

The year-end Census budget forecast for expenditure is approximately £48,000 together with salaries and on-costs included.

Reserves

The project reserve figure being carried forward into 2013-14 will be in the region of £547,950.

Staffing

The recruitment process for a Census Analyst/Trainer began in February 2012. The successful candidate joined the GLA in June 2012 on a three year fixed term contract until June 2015. Currently the GLA are assessing what additional resources will be necessary to deliver a comprehensive and timely programme for its members.
