Introduction

This is a preliminary briefing based mainly on the 2001 Census Key Statistics published in February 2003 for boroughs and in June 2003 for wards. It uses data from the 2001 Census questions on ethnic group, religion and country of birth to give a first brief analysis of London's culturally diverse population.

The question on ethnic group was developed from the first ever question on ethnicity included in the 1991 Census. The categories used in 2001 were a compromise between totally new categories that would better reflect respondents' self-defined ethnicity and categories that would allow some statistical comparison with 1991 and therefore also give some measure of change over the decade.

The new question on religion was the first ever voluntary question in a UK Census and, even though response was voluntary, around 93 per cent of respondents answered the question. The high response rate means that the statistics on religion are probably just as good as those derived from answers to the compulsory questions, such as ethnic group and country of birth.

Country of birth has been included in many previous Censuses and can be used to compare with previous decades. The main difference from previous Censuses is in the definition of individual countries that exist at any one point in time. For example Yugoslavia existed in 1991 as a single country but by 2001 was split into various countries which have been labelled in the statistics 'former Yugoslavia'.

The statistics included in this Briefing are simply univariate counts of these three variables and do not include any of the cross-tabulations that are included in the more detailed Standard Tables. These will be the subject of a range of further analyses, briefings and profiles. Nevertheless, there is a wealth of fascinating information to be gleaned from the data included here. The following sections look at the three variables, ethnicity, religion and country of birth, their distributions across London, comparisons with other parts of the country and national rankings. There are then sections on each specific group.

Ethnic group

Table 1 shows the ethnic group categories for which 2001 Census data is available as well as the numbers and percentages of London's population in each group and the percentage of each group in England and Wales that lives in London.

There are now more than 2 million London residents in ethnic groups other than White, plus more than 220,000 Irish and nearly 595,000 Other White groups. This adds up to almost 2.9 million London residents who are in ethnic groups other than White British.

The largest single non-White group in London, as well as nationally, is Indian. Just over 6 per cent of London's population is Indian. The second largest group in London is now Black African, closely followed by Black Caribbean (which was the second largest group in 1991) with 5.3 and 4.8 per cent respectively.

In a 'diversity' ranking of English and Welsh local authorities based on the proportion of non-White ethnic groups in the population, London boroughs occupy the top nine positions, and 16 of the top 20. The top five are Newham 60.6 per cent, Brent 54.7 per cent, Tower Hamlets


48.6 per cent, Ealing 41.3 per cent and Harrow 41.2 per cent. Non-London authorities in the list are Slough (10th), Leicester (11th), Birmingham (17th) and Luton (18th).

If White ethnic groups (Irish and Other White) are included then more than 70 per cent of the population of Brent and more than 66 per cent of the population of Newham are in groups other than White British.

Proportions of ethnic groups living in London

Around 46 per cent of all non-White ethnic minority groups in England and Wales live in London as well as 44 per cent of all groups other than White British. The proportions of individual ethnic groups living in London differ considerably. Some groups are mainly based in London, for example 79 per cent of Black Africans live in London, and some groups mainly based elsewhere, for example only 20 per cent of Pakistanis live in London. The largest numbers of Pakistanis outside London are in Birmingham (more than 104,000) and Bradford (nearly 68,000). The largest concentrations are in Bradford (nearly 15 per cent of the

population), Pendle (over 13 per cent) and Slough (more than 12 per cent).

The following sections look at each of the identified groups separately and give a more detailed picture of where they live across London, and how this compares with other districts in England.

White British

The largest concentration of White British people in London is in Havering, with just over 92 per cent White British. While this is very high for London, Havering only ranks 244 out of the 354 local authority districts in England. Bexley and Bromley have the next largest proportions in London, 88 and 86 per cent respectively, ranking 281st and 291st in England and Wales. Slough and Leicester are the only non-London Boroughs in the bottom 25 local authority districts ranked on the proportion of White British residents in their populations.

Map 1 shows the distribution of the White British population across London wards. It illustrates very clearly the concentrations in Outer South and East London, in stark contrast with wards in much of Inner London and large parts of Outer London. The largest proportion of White British

is in Cranham ward in Havering with 94.8 per cent. Havering, Bexley and Bromley account for the top 30 wards in London on the proportion of White British. The lowest proportion of White British in London is in Southall Broadway in Ealing (8.7 per cent), with very low proportions also in Green Street East and West in Newham (11.0 and 11.9 per cent), Southall Green in Ealing (12.4 per cent) and East Ham North in Newham (12.6 per cent). Outside Ealing and Newham, Wembley Central, Alperton and Tokyngton in Brent, Spitalfields and Banglatown in Tower Hamlets and Clementswood and Loxford in Redbridge all have less than 25 per cent White British. In total 20 wards in London have less than 25 per cent White British.

White Irish

Just over a third of all Irish people in England and Wales, as defined in the 2001 Census, live in London, making up just over 3 per cent of London's population. The largest proportions in London and nationally are in Brent, Islington, Hammersmith and Fulham and Ealing. The proportions in these boroughs vary from 6.9 to 4.7 per cent. The only local authority districts outside London in the top 20 ranked on the size of the Irish population are Luton, Manchester, Coventry and Birmingham.

Map 2 shows the percentage of Irish in all wards in London and the concentrations in West London. The largest proportions are in Dollis Hill, Mapesbury and Dudden Hill in Brent, Junction in Islington, Kilburn, Willesden Green and Welsh Harp in Brent, followed by Wealdstone in Harrow. The lowest proportions of Irish in London wards are in Bromley and Newham - Biggin Hill in Bromley, Green Street East and West in Newham. The only 2 wards outside Bromley and Newham in the bottom 10 are Clayhall in Redbridge and Thames in Barking and Dagenham.

White Other

The category White Other includes a very wide range of people and cannot be regarded as a group with a specific cultural identity of its own. In different parts of London and the country this group includes very different people. Further cross-tabulations, such as by country of birth, will shed more light on the nature of the White Other population in different areas. These will be included in future analyses and profiles.

More than 44 per cent of the group as a whole live in London. It forms a significant part of the population in Kensington and Chelsea (25 per cent) and Westminster (21 per cent), the local authority districts with the largest proportions in England. The only districts outside London in the top 25 ranked local authorities are Forest Heath, Cambridge, Oxford and Elmbridge. Other London boroughs with large White Other populations are Haringey, Camden and Hammersmith and Fulham, ranked 4th, 5th and 6th in England.

Map 3 shows a swathe of White Other groups from Enfield in North London, going south west towards Richmond. At this stage we can only speculate that the large proportions in Enfield and Haringey are likely to be because of their large Cypriot populations, while the White Other populations in central and south west London are likely to be from a range of groups, including Arabs, Americans and Europeans. The largest proportions of White Others are mainly in wards in Kensington and Chelsea. Queen's Gate, Courtfield, Brompton and Camden ranged from 37 to 32 per cent. Lancaster Gate and Knightsbridge and Belgravia in Westminster are the only

two wards outside Kensington and Chelsea in the top 10. The lowest proportions in London are in wards in Havering, Bexley, Barking and Dagenham. The bottom 20 wards are all in these three boroughs.

Indian

Just over 6 per cent of London's population is Indian, with just over 42 per cent of all Indians in England and Wales living in London. The proportion of Indians in London boroughs is largest in Harrow, Brent, Ealing, Hounslow and Redbridge. Harrow has the second largest proportion in the country at nearly 22 per cent, second only to 26 per cent in Leicester. The lowest ranking borough in London is Havering, with only 1.2 per cent, but Havering still features in the top 100 local authority districts in England.

Map 4 shows the percentage of Indian residents in wards in London, with all the boroughs listed above showing large concentrations. The largest are over 54 per cent in Southall Broadway and Southall Green in Ealing. Lady Margaret ward, also in Ealing, has just below 50 per cent. The fourth largest percentage is in Kenton East in Harrow (45 per cent). There are 45 wards in London with 20 per cent or more Indians in their population.

There are 39 wards in London with less than 1 per cent Indian, and in particular Mayesbrook, Alibon and Heath in Barking and Dagenham, Darwin in Bromley, Faraday in Southwark and Gooshays in Havering all have less than half of one per cent.

Sections below which look at religion, particularly Hindu and Sikh, also shed light on the Indian population. Cross-tabulations of ethnicity and religion, amongst other things, will allow a much more detailed analysis than could be done from the 1991 Census.

Pakistani

The Pakistani population of England and Wales is far less concentrated in London than any other ethnic group, with only 20 per cent living in London. Nevertheless it still makes up 2 per cent of London's population overall, and far more in some areas.

The largest proportions in London are in the east London boroughs of Newham (8 per cent), Waltham Forest (8 per cent) and Redbridge (6 per cent), which come 7th, 8th and 13th in the national ranking. The largest proportions in England, and the only areas with larger proportions than any of the London boroughs, are in Bradford, Pendle, Slough, Birmingham, Luton and Blackburn and Darwen ranging from 15 to 8 per cent.

Map 5 shows the concentrations of Pakistani residents in parts of Newham, Waltham Forest and Redbridge, in addition to those in Hounslow, Brent, Ealing, Croydon and Merton. The wards in London with the largest concentrations of Pakistani residents are Clementswood and Loxford in Redbridge (both almost 19 per cent), followed by four wards in Newham, East Ham North, Green Street West, East Ham Central and Green Street East (all between 16 and 18 per cent). There are 21 wards in London with more than 10 per cent Pakistanis. The only wards outside Newham, Waltham Forest and Redbridge in this list are Abbey ward in Barking and Dagenham and Southall Broadway in Ealing.

Black African

Black African is the group that is most highly concentrated in London, with 79 per cent of all Black Africans in England and Wales living in London. It is now the second largest ethnic group other than White in London, behind Indian, with 5.3 per cent of the population in this group. Southwark (16 per cent), Newham (13 per cent), Hackney (12 per cent) and Lambeth (12 per cent) had the largest proportions in the country. London completely dominates the national ranking for Black Africans, with all of the top 25 authorities being London boroughs. The local authority district outside London with the largest proportion of Black Africans is Slough with 1.9 per cent, and ranked 26.

Map 9 shows the distribution of Black Africans across all wards in London. The top three wards are all in Southwark - Peckham has nearly 36 per cent, Livesey has 27 per cent and Faraday has 25 per cent. There are six other wards with more than 20 per cent Black Africans, Evelyn in Lewisham, Camberwell Green and East Walworth in Southwark, Royal Docks in Newham and Chaucer and Brunswick Park in Southwark. At the other end of the scale there are more than 100 wards in London with less than one per cent Black Africans.

Black Other

Black Other is another group that is largely concentrated in London (63 per cent). Further analysis is likely to show that it has a younger age structure than either the Black Caribbean or Black African groups. It comprises less than one per cent of London's population. Hackney, Lambeth and Lewisham have the largest proportions in the country at over 2 per cent. As with Black African, the national rankings are largely dominated by London boroughs, with the only district outside London in the top 19 being Forest Heath (which contains an American air base).

Map 10 shows the distribution across all wards in London. The largest proportion is just over 4 per cent in Harlesden in Brent and King's Park in Hackney. The next three wards are Coldharbour in Lambeth, Stonebridge in Brent and Peckham in Southwark.

Mixed groups

Mixed ethnicity was introduced as a new category in the 2001 Census, and in the tabulations is split into four separate categories of mixed groups. The main reason that this split is useful is for comparisons with the 1991 Census categories (see below). The four mixed categories in themselves tend to have very small numbers and any cross-tabulations of them separately may not be very useful because of this. Mixed groups, especially White and Black Caribbean and White and Black African are much less concentrated in London than are the Black Caribbean and Black African groups.

Mixed White and Black Caribbean is highest in the country in Lambeth (2 per cent), Nottingham comes second with Lewisham third at 1.9 per cent. The largest proportion in the country of mixed White and Black African is 0.81 per cent in Lambeth. Southwark, Hackney, Haringey and Islington come next in the rankings, which are very much dominated by London boroughs.

Mixed White and Asians live in different parts of London, with just over 1 per cent in Westminster, Ealing, Kensington and Chelsea, Hounslow, Haringey, Croydon, Barnet, Merton and Camden. Other Mixed is highest in Kensington and Chelsea, Westminster and Camden but with proportions of just over one per cent.

Map 11 shows the distribution of the four Mixed groups combined for wards in London. The largest proportion is in Golborne ward in Kensington and Chelsea with 6.8 per cent. Other wards with more than six per cent are Colville in Kensington and Chelsea, Westbourne and Queen's Park in Westminster, St Charles in Kensington and Chelsea plus Knight's Hill in Lambeth.

Chinese

Just over 1 per cent of London's population is Chinese and it is widely distributed across London, as well as across the country. Just over 35 per cent of Chinese people in England and Wales live in London. Only four local authority districts in England and Wales have more than 2 per cent Chinese - Westminster, Cambridge, the City of London and Barnet. London boroughs tend to dominate the national rankings with 16 out of the top 20.

Map 12 shows the distribution across wards in London. The largest proportions are in Millwall (5.3 per cent) and Blackwall and Cubitt (4.7 per cent) in Tower Hamlets, Evelyn in Lewisham, West End in Westminster, King's Cross in Camden, Colindale in Barnet, New Cross in Lewisham and Lancaster Gate in Westminster, all with more than 4 per cent.

Other groups

Other groups could include a wide variety of people from different backgrounds. It may be possible with additional data in the future to say more about specific Other groups in different parts of London. At this stage it is treated as a residual category for all groups that were not covered by the other categories.

The top 17 local authority districts in the country, ranked on the proportion of Other groups are all London boroughs. The proportions are largest in Westminster and Kensington and Chelsea, followed by Ealing, Camden, Barnet, and Kingston upon Thames. All of these vary from 4.1 to 2.5 per cent.

Map 13 gives the ward distribution, with the largest proportion being almost 10 per cent in Hanger Hill in Ealing. There is just over 6 per cent in Golborne in Kensington and Chelsea, and in Regent's Park and Hyde Park in Westminster. Other wards with relatively large proportions of Other groups are Totteridge in Barnet, Notting Barns in Kensington and Chelsea, Abbey Road in Westminster and Plaistow South in Newham.

Comparisons of ethnic groups in 1991 and 2001 Censuses

There have been a number of changes between the 1991 and 2001 Censuses which complicate comparisons between the two. The first main change is in categories used in the question on ethnic group. The 2001 question has more categories and includes a new Mixed group with four sub-categories, and these will have some impact on how the question was answered. The addition of the new ethnic group categories for 2001, together with changes over time in how people perceive their own ethnicity, present difficulties in making direct comparisons with 1991 and measuring change over the decade. Even so, comparisons *will* be made and, while further research is needed, a pragmatic approach has been taken here to include some best estimates of change between 1991 and 2001.

Early work undertaken by ONS on measuring the potential impact of change in ethnic group categories since 1991 (undertaken as part of the small scale testing programme) has led to the decision in this Briefing to compare categories in the manner indicated in Table 2. This reallocates the mixed groups in 2001 to what appear, at this stage, to be the most likely categories that would have been used if the 1991 classification had been used in the 2001 Census.

Other differences are in the population base, and the way students are treated in the statistics. In 2001 no information was collected on visitors, while students are treated as resident at their term time address, whereas in 1991 they were treated as resident at their home address. This will make a difference in areas with large numbers of students. This is not only related to comparisons based on ethnic group and country of birth, but affects all comparisons between the 1991 and 2001 Censuses.

Further research will be undertaken to determine the best way to compare with 1991, and further detailed data will be commissioned if it helps us to make better comparisons and give better measures of change. Further research on very detailed data and how to compare the 1991 and 2001 categories will be fundamental to providing the basis of future demographic work. However, it may be of more limited use in comparing changes in, for example, detailed housing or labour market studies related to ethnicity, because the data available on these topics will still be limited to the categories that were used in the main tabulations from the 1991 and 2001 Censuses. Therefore a best fit way of comparing the 1991 and 2001 ethnic group categories is still essential.

Doubts have arisen about the levels of imputation in 1991. There has been some suggestion that it increased the figures by too much. The starting points for comparisons with 1991 are, therefore, the 1991 Census (which was on a slightly different base and was thought to exclude a large number of young men) or the 1991 Census grossed to the original 1991 mid-year estimates (which are on the same population base as the 2001 Census, but are now thought to have been over-adjusted to include about 59,000 too many young men). The 2001 mid-year estimates have recently been adjusted upwards to account for large numbers of missing young men (120,000 mainly aged 25 to 34 in London) who were thought to have been missed by the 2001 Census, mainly due to not having any 'usual' address in the UK.

Meanwhile, there is a lot of interest in measuring change over the decade, and this Briefing includes the best attempts that we can make, at this point in time, to look at broad changes by ethnic group between 1991 and 2001.

Table 3 gives the two different bases for 1991, the 1991 Census and the 1991 Census grossed to the original 1991 mid-year estimate. The latter is likely to be the most accurate, as it avoids the problem of students being counted in the wrong place and includes the missing young men, who we think really were missing. It also includes the 2001 figures (based on the GLA's ethnic group projections) that were implied by the 2001 Census, as well as the 2001 Census figures by 1991 ethnic group categories.

Changes in ethnic groups 1991-2001

Table 4 shows three different measures of change and, despite some slight differences, the broad message is similar whichever measure is used. We would recommend, at this stage, using the last two columns in Table 4, which compare 1991 Census figures grossed to the 1991 mid-year estimates with the 2001 Census figures.

This shows the overall increase between 1991 and 2001 in London's population at around 4 per cent, or growth of around 280,000 people. The ethnic composition of the population has

changed significantly. The White population has fallen in number and as a percentage of the total, while all other groups have increased in number and as a percentage of the total.

The largest, and least well predicted, growth has been in the Black African population, which has more than doubled, thus making this the second largest ethnic group after Indian. This is a major change since 1991 when Black Caribbean was the second largest ethnic group.

Black Other, which is a smaller and younger group than both Black African and Black Caribbean has also increased considerably in size, to almost double what it was in 1991. The Black Caribbean group has grown by a slightly larger number than the Black Other group, but by a smaller percentage because of the relative sizes of the two groups.

The number of Bangladeshis in London has increased by nearly three quarters since 1991, Pakistanis by more than half, while the Indian group has only grown by just over a fifth. In terms of numbers, though, the growth in the Indian population has been the largest (more than 80,000), while the Bangladeshi population has grown by around 65,000 and the Pakistani population by around 52,000. Much of this growth is a predicted natural growth in population because of the age profile of these groups of Londoners.

Appendix Tables 7 to 10 give the figures for change between 1991 and 2001 at borough level.

Religion

This was a new question in 2001 which will, hopefully, help us get a better understanding of ethnicity in London. It is clear that, for many of London's residents, cultural identity is defined far better by their religion than by an ethnic group category. Future Briefings will look into the details of cross-tabulations of ethnic group by religion and other characteristics.

Table 5 gives the numbers and percentage of the population of London in each of the religions identified by the Census. The largest religion is Christian, with just over 58 per cent of London's population stating this as their religion. That is nearly 4.2 million Londoners. This compares with almost 72 per cent of all people in England and Wales.

The second most common religion in London is Muslim, with which 8.5 per cent of Londoners identify, that is more than 607,000 people. Just under 40 per cent of all Muslims in England and Wales live in London.

Just over 4 per cent of Londoners are Hindus, that is nearly 292,000 people. Almost 53 per cent of all Hindus in England and Wales live in London. The next largest religion is Jewish, with which 2.1 per cent of London's population identifies. There are nearly 150,000 Londoners stating Jewish as their religion, more than 57 per cent of all Jews in England and Wales. Just under one third of all Sikhs in England and Wales live in London, more than 104,000, 1.5 per cent of London's population.

There are more than 54,000 Buddhists in London as well as more than 36,000 people stating 'Other religions'. More than 1.1 million Londoners said that they had no religion and more than 621,000 did not answer the question.

The following sections look at each religion in turn and give a more detailed picture of where they live across London, and how this compares with the size of groups in other parts of England and Wales.

Christians


Christians are the largest religious group in London identified by the 2001 Census. Just over 58 per cent of London's population identified themselves as Christian, compared with 72 per cent of the population of England and Wales.

The largest proportions of Christians in London are in Havering (76.1%), Bexley (72.9%), Bromley (72.0%), Sutton (70.0%) and Barking and Dagenham (69.0%). There are seven boroughs with less than half of residents Christian. They are Tower Hamlets (38.6%), Hackney (46.6%), Newham (46.8%), Camden (47.1%), Barnet (47.3%), Harrow (47.3%) and Brent (47.7%).

Map 14 shows the distribution of Christians across all wards in London. The top 6 wards are all in Havering - Cranham (82%), Upminster (81%), Hylands (79%), Pettits (79%), St Andrew's (79%) and Elm Park (78%). The top 21 wards in London are all in Havering, Bexley or Bromley.

There are seven wards in London with less than 25 per cent Christian. The lowest proportions of Christians in London are in Southall Broadway in Ealing (15.9%), Spitalfields and Banglatown in Tower Hamlets (18.3%), Southall Green in Ealing (18.9%), Whitechapel in Tower Hamlets (21.2%) and Green Street West (21.2%), East Ham North (22.1%) and Green Street East (23.7%) in Newham.

Muslims

Muslims are the second largest religious group in London after Christians. More than 39 per cent of all Muslims in England and Wales live in London. Muslims make up 8.5 per cent of London’s population, compared with 3 per cent of the population of England and Wales. There are more than 607,000 Muslims in London, with slightly more in Inner London (322,691) than in Outer London (284,392).

Tower Hamlets has more than 71,000 Muslims, that is 36.4 per cent of the population of the borough. Newham, with more than 59,000 Muslims, has the second largest proportion at 24.3 per cent. In Waltham Forest, Hackney, Brent, Redbridge, Camden, Haringey and Ealing at least 10 per cent of the population is Muslim. The boroughs of Havering, Bexley and Bromley have the lowest proportions of Muslims, all with less than 2 per cent.

Map 15 shows the proportions of Muslims in all wards in London. In particular it shows the concentrations in Tower Hamlets and Newham. It shows that there are wards in Tower Hamlets, Newham, Redbridge, Waltham Forest and Westminster with more than 25 per cent Muslims. Four wards in Tower Hamlets have more than half of their populations Muslim - Spitalfields and Banglatown (62%), Whitechapel (54%), Bethnal Green South (52%) and Shadwell (52%). Green Street West in Newham has 47 per cent. The top 18 wards in London are in Tower Hamlets or Newham. Outside these two boroughs the top two wards in London are Clementswood and Loxford in Redbridge, both more than 31 per cent Muslim. There are 28 wards in London with less than 1 per cent Muslims - all in Havering, Bexley or Bromley.

Hindus

Almost 53 per cent of all Hindus in England and Wales live in London, making up just over 4 per cent of London's population. The proportion in Outer London (5.4%) is considerably higher than that in Inner London (1.9%). This compares with 1.1 per cent of the population of England who are Hindus.

The boroughs with by far the largest proportions of Hindus are Harrow (19.6%) and Brent (17.2%). The next largest proportions are 7.8 per cent in both Ealing and Redbridge. The largest numbers of Hindus are 45,228 in Brent, 40,548 in Harrow, 23,384 in Ealing, 21,011 in Barnet, 18,661 in Redbridge, 16,901 in Newham, 16,781 in Croydon and 16,064 in Hounslow.

Only one of the top 20 wards in London is outside Harrow and Brent. The largest proportion is in Kenton East in Harrow (42.6%), followed by Wembley Central in Brent (38.9%), Queensbury in Harrow (37.9%), Alperton and Queensbury in Brent (35.6%). The only ward in the top 20 outside Harrow and Brent is Southall Broadway in Ealing (20.4%).

Map 16 shows the distribution in all wards in London and illustrates the concentrations in Harrow, Brent and Ealing. There are also concentrations in Redbridge, particularly in Newbury, Clayhall, Clementswood, Loxford, Barkingside, Cranbrook and Goodmayes, all with between 14 and 11 per cent; Newham, particularly in Green Street East, Wall End, East Ham North, East Ham Central and Green Street West, all with between 18 and 14 per cent; Hounslow, particularly in Hounslow Heath, Hounslow West, Hounslow Central, Heston Central, Heston East, Cranford, Heston West, Osterly and Spring Grove, all with between 18 and 10 per cent; Croydon, particularly West Thornton, Bensham Manor and Broad Green, all with between 16 and 12 per cent; and Graveney ward in Merton with 13 per cent.

Jews

Just under 58 per cent of all Jews identified in the 2001 Census in England and Wales live in London. They make up just over 2 per cent of London's population. The proportion is slightly higher in Outer than Inner London. Around 0.5 per cent of the total population of England and Wales is identified as Jewish.

The largest proportion of Jews is in Barnet, with 14.8 per cent. This is followed by Harrow (6.3%) and Redbridge (6.2%). Camden and Hackney are the only other boroughs with more than 5 per cent Jewish. The size of the Jewish population in Barnet is 46,686, far larger than the next largest which is 14,796 in Redbridge. There are more than 10,000 Jews in Harrow, Camden and Hackney.

The wards in London with the largest proportion of Jews are Garden Suburb (37.1%) and Edgware (36.7%) in Barnet, Canons in Harrow (35.9%), Hendon (30.4%), Golders Green (29.5%), Finchley Church End (28.6%) in Barnet, Stanmore Park (27.3%) in Harrow, Springfield in Hackney (23.5%), Barkingside in Redbridge (21.1%) and New River in Hackney (20.4%).

Map 17 illustrates this distribution for all wards in London.

Sikhs

Almost 32 per cent of all Sikhs in England and Wales live in London. The proportion of Londoners identifying themselves as Sikh in the 2001 Census is 1.5 per cent, that is 104,230 people. There are far more Sikhs in Outer London than Inner London (90,036 compared with 14,194). The proportions are 2.0 per cent of the population in Outer London, 0.5 per cent in Inner London and 0.6 per cent in England and Wales.

The boroughs with the largest proportions of Sikhs are Hounslow (8.6%), Ealing (8.5%), Redbridge (5.5%) and Hillingdon (4.6%). The next largest is 2.8 per cent in Newham. The largest numbers are in the same four boroughs, Ealing has 25,625, Hounslow has 18,265, Redbridge has 13,022 and Hillingdon has 11,056. The next largest number is 6,897 in Newham.

The wards with the largest proportions of Sikhs are Southall Green (39.5%), Southall Broadway (36.6%), Lady Margaret (31.4%) in Ealing, and Heston East (25.1%) in Hounslow. The largest proportions outside Ealing and Hounslow are in Pinkwell (17.0%) and Barnhill (16.4%) in Hillingdon, Seven Kings (13.5%), Goodmayes (12.4%) and Clementswood (11.5%) in Redbridge. Map 18 illustrates this.

Buddhists

Almost 38 per cent of all Buddhists in England and Wales live in London. Less than 1 per cent of London's population are Buddhists (0.8% or 54,297 people), and there is relatively little variation between boroughs. This compares with 0.3 per cent of the population of England and Wales.

Westminster and Camden both have 1.3 per cent Buddhists, the largest proportions in any borough. The wards in London with the largest proportions of Buddhists are Evelyn in Lewisham (4.4%), Hanger Hill in Ealing (3.2%), Totteridge in Barnet (2.5%) and Regent's Park in Westminster (2.3%). Map 19 illustrates this.

Other religions

Just under a quarter of people in England and Wales stating Other Religions in the 2001 Census live in London. The proportion of London's population was small at 0.5 per cent, but this is still 36,558 people. The only boroughs with more than 1 per cent in other religions are Harrow (2.0%), Brent (1.1%) and Barnet (1.0%).

The wards with the largest proportions are Kenton West in Harrow (6.6%), Kenton in Brent (5.3%), Queensbury (3.6%), Kenton East (3.0%), Belmont (2.8%), Canons (2.5%) and Hatch End (2.4%), all in Harrow. Map 20 illustrates this.

No religion

Just under 16 per cent of Londoners said that they had no religion in the 2001 Census. This category includes the 1 per cent who described themselves as Jedi. The largest proportions are in the City of London (24.6%), Islington (23.7%), Camden (22.0%), Lambeth (21.7%), Lewisham (20.4%), Haringey and Wandsworth (both 20.0%).

The wards with the largest proportions were Stroud Green (32.7%), Crouch End (31.8%), Muswell Hill (29.3%) in Haringey, and Kentish Town (29.0%) and Highgate (28.1%) in Camden.

Religion not stated

The 2001 Census was the first Census in England and Wales that has included a voluntary question. Only Northern Ireland has previously included a voluntary question, also based on religion. Religion is, therefore, the only classification in the 2001 Census that has a not stated category. No information on religion was imputed, unlike many other questions where non responses were replaced by an imputed response. Nevertheless, overall 93 per cent of the population of England and Wales answered the question on religion.

The largest proportions with religion not stated are in Haringey (12.1%), Hackney (12.0%), Lambeth (10.9%), Islington (10.1%), Lewisham (10.1%) and Camden (10.0%).

The largest proportions not stated are in Lordship (19.0%) and Springfield (17.8%) in Hackney and Northumberland Park (16.6%) in Haringey.

Country of birth

Country of birth has been included in many previous Censuses, even if some of the details of countries outside the UK and Ireland have been different in each census. This is because of changing interest in the countries that UK residents were born in, as well as the changing political/geographical world. That is, new countries exist each time a Census is carried out, for example 'Former Yugoslavia' did not exist in the same form in 1991. The countries from which there are large numbers of people in London also change over time, so that published statistics give details of different countries in each Census, for example Somalia was not identified separately in the 1991 Census and large numbers of refugees arrived shortly after the content of the 1991 Census had been decided. It has not therefore been possible to get information on people born in Somalia in the decade since then. This has now been rectified, and the 2001 Census shows just under 34,000 London residents born in Somalia.

This Briefing includes a preliminary analysis of the country of birth of London's residents. Further work will be undertaken and presented in future Briefings. Table 6 gives the country of birth breakdown for Londoners in 2001 and 1991. Some of the list of countries are the same in both Census years, and for these countries the change over the decade is included. Some countries are included in larger totals such as Central and Western Africa or in sub-totals such as Other Central and Western Africa. Further detail on some of these countries may be available at a later date in commissioned tables.

For the analysis of country of birth data we have looked at both percentages in the population and numbers of people born in various countries. The percentages in the total population of London are often relatively small and much important information is missed if only proportions are presented. This Briefing therefore includes some detail of numbers of Londoners born in various countries, and maps of country of birth are based on numbers of people rather than, as is usual, percentages of the population. The only word of caution is in interpreting maps that have areas of different sizes, such as large wards which might contain parks or other green (or

not so green) spaces. These could give a misleading impression. The main purpose of the country of birth maps (Maps 21 to 30) is to show where in London various communities live and their relative sizes. These maps, along with a number of others, are available in DMAG Briefing 2003-22 Mapping Diversity in London: 2001 Census results, published alongside this Briefing.

Country of birth detail for Londoners

Table 6 gives both 2001 and 1991 Census statistics on country of birth, and change over the decade for countries or groupings which were included in both Censuses. It shows that just over three quarters of Londoners were born in the UK or Ireland, with 70 per cent born in England, 9 per cent born in Asian and 6 per cent born in Africa. The percentages become small when looking at individual countries of birth, so the rest of this section looks at the numbers born in particular countries outside the UK.

Table 6 shows large numbers of people born in Europe, particularly in EU countries such as the Republic of Ireland (157,556) which has by far the largest number. Other EU countries with particularly large numbers include France (38,130), Germany (39,818) and Italy (38,694). Table 6 includes Austria, Finland and Sweden in the EU in 1991 for comparative purposes although they only joined the EU in 1995. There are also 118,435 people born in Eastern Europe.

There are a very large number of Londoners born in Africa (454,536), with the individual countries identified so far being Nigeria (68,907), Sierra Leone (14,008), Kenya (66,311), Somalia (33,831) and South Africa (45,507). Many of those born in Kenya, though, are likely to be Asian.

Asia had even larger numbers - with 634,917 people in London born in Asia. This includes 386,213 born in South Asia which comprises India (172,661), Bangladesh (84,565), Pakistan (66,458), Sri Lanka (49,932) and Afghanistan (10,832). There are also large numbers born in the Middle East and Far East. Details of individual countries in the Far and Middle East are not yet available.

Other countries or groupings in which large numbers of Londoners were born include Jamaica (80,319), Other Caribbean and West Indies (62,180), South America (44,179), Australia (41,488) and New Zealand (27,494).

Change in country of birth 1991-2001

The biggest changes in the countries of birth of London's population are the huge increase in the number born in Africa, an increase of 85 per cent or 208,511 people. Within this total there are large increases in the numbers born in Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Kenya, South Africa and Zimbabwe. More detail will be available later in commissioned tables. These figures certainly contribute to the reason why Black African has now overtaken Black Caribbean as the second largest non-White ethnic group in London.

Asia, which is defined differently in 1991 and 2001, is likely to have a large increase. There were especially large increases in the numbers of Londoners born in Bangladesh (27,908), India (21,042), Pakistan (21,917) and Sri Lanka (24,114).

There was a large increase in the number of people born in the EU outside the UK and Ireland (64,136). All EU countries except the Republic of Ireland (-56,477) and Austria (-705) show an increase. It is likely that economic factors in the Republic of Ireland have led to large numbers of people returning from the UK.

There was also a large increase, and maybe not entirely counted, in the number of people born in Former Yugoslavia (20,552). Other countries or groupings showing big increases are Turkey (18,702), USA (11,955), South America (28,230), Australia (18,173) and New Zealand (9,115).

Further work

There will be more detailed country of birth data available when the commissioned tables arrive. Further work will be undertaken to analyse this in more detail, and to look at cross-tabulations of country of birth with other characteristics in the Census as well as details by London borough which are not included here. This Briefing is just the start.
