1 Key points

- In January 2003 there were 3,033 schools in London, including nursery, primary, secondary, special and independent schools, pupil referral units, city technology colleges and academies. There were five city technology colleges and two academies in London. These are secondary schools funded through central rather than local government, and are registered as independent schools.
- There were 1,205,060 pupils on roll in these institutions, mainly on a full-time basis.
- There were 81,760 teachers in London's schools.
- There were, on average in London, 16 pupils to each teacher in maintained nursery schools, 23 in maintained primary schools, and 17 in maintained secondary schools. There were 10 pupils to each teacher in London's independent schools.
- The majority of London primary pupils were taught in classes of between 21 and 30 children.
- Similarly, the majority of London's secondary pupils were taught in classes of between 21 and 30 pupils.
- Almost 1 in 3 primary and secondary school children in inner London were entitled to free school meals. This is considerably above the national average,
- More than a third of pupils in special schools in outer London, and more than half in special schools in inner London, were entitled to free school meals.
- Pupils in maintained secondary schools were more likely than pupils in primary schools to have a statement of special educational needs.
- Less than 1 per cent of pupils in independent schools had a statement of special educational needs, compared with 2.6 per cent in London's maintained secondary schools.
- Slightly under half of primary pupils in inner London, and slightly more than a quarter in outer London, had a first language which the school knew or believed to be, other than English.
- Seventy five per cent of primary pupils in inner London who were of compulsory school age and above had an ethnic heritage other than White British.
- The equivalent figure for pupils attending maintained secondary schools in London was 73 per cent. If the composition of London's maintained schools is taken as a guide then, by any reasonable measure, London is a multi-ethnic city.
- The pupil exclusion rate is around 20 per cent higher in London than in England as a whole in secondary schools but in primary schools about 2 per cent lower.
- In the 2002/3 school year, the pupil absence rate in London's primary schools was above the national average, but was below the national average in secondary schools.
- The percentage of pupils reaching nationally expected levels in tests at the end of key stages 1, 2 and 3 were slightly below the national average. This is particularly the case in schools in inner London.
- In line with national trends, the percentage of pupils aged 15 at the start of the school year achieving 5 or more higher grade passes in public examinations has improved in London as a whole. However the proportion of children achieving those passes was slightly below the national average. The gap was more pronounced in inner than in outer London.
- The percentage of children in that age group who achieve no pass in GCSE examinations or the equivalent, has not changed dramatically in London or in England over the period 1998 to 2003.

2 Number of schools

In January 2003, there were 86 nursery schools in Greater London, of which 51 were in inner London. London's maintained nursery schools accounted for 18 per cent of all nursery schools in England. There were 1,862 maintained primary schools in London, including middle schools deemed primary, accounting for 10 per cent of the national total. Sixty two per cent of London's primary schools were in outer London. There were 407 maintained secondary schools in Greater London, 12 per cent of the England total. Sixty seven per cent of London's secondary schools were in outer London (see table A1). In addition, there were 152 maintained special schools in Greater London, representing 14 per cent of the English total. Unlike their mainstream counterparts, the majority of maintained special schools were to be found in inner London. Finally, there were 456 independent schools in Greater London, with approximately equal numbers in inner and in outer London. Twenty one per cent of England's independent schools were in London. This is a considerably higher proportion than might have been expected from the equivalent figures for maintained primary and secondary schools (see table A2).

3 Number of pupils

In January 2003, 7,730 children attended maintained nursery schools in Greater London, representing 19 per cent of the total for England. Seventy one per cent of pupils in London's nursery schools had a full-time place, the same as the English average figure. However, the proportion for outer London was lower at 65 per cent.

There were 632,870 pupils on roll in maintained primary schools, including middle schools deemed primary, accounting for 15 per cent of pupils in maintained primary schools in England. The majority, 63 per cent, of London's primary pupils attended schools in outer London.

In 2003 there were somewhat fewer (417,910) pupils on roll in maintained secondary schools in Greater London, representing 13 per cent of the English total. The overwhelming majority of primary and secondary pupils have a full-time place in the school they attend (see tables A2 and A3). A minority of primary pupils attend part-time in nursery classes within their school, while others will have dual registration in pupil referral units or special schools.

Special schools can cater for pupils across the primary and secondary age range, and 11,760 pupils attended London special schools in 2003. This was 13 per cent of the English total. The majority, 63 per cent, of pupils on the roll of London's special schools, attended school in outer London. The majority of pupils attending special schools do so on a full-time basis (see table A3).

As might be expected from the number of schools, a high proportion of pupils in England who attend independent schools do so in London (21 per cent). The equivalent figure for the percentage of pupils in city technology colleges and academies was 34 per cent. The total number of pupils attending independent schools was 125,120, and 6,800 attended city technology colleges and academies taken together.

4 Number of teachers and pupil-teacher ratios

In January 2003, 420 teachers were employed in London's nursery schools, representing 24 per cent of all teachers in England working in nursery schools. Two hundred and fifty teachers worked at nursery schools in inner London.

A far larger number of teachers (33,520) taught in primary schools and in middle schools deemed primary. Sixty three per cent of London's primary teachers taught in schools in outer London. In 2003, 15 per cent, a little more than 1 in 7 primary teachers in England, taught in a London school.

At 29,800, there were slightly fewer secondary than primary teachers working in London schools, though London secondary school teachers still accounted for 13 per cent of all teachers working in maintained secondary schools in England (see table A4a). The majority, 68 per cent, of London's secondary teachers worked in outer London.

In addition, in 2003 2,470 teachers were employed in maintained special schools in Greater London, with the majority, 60 per cent, working in outer London. Teachers in London's special schools amounted to 15 per cent of teachers working in maintained special schools in England.

There were 14,260 teachers employed in independent schools in Greater London, representing 20 per cent of the total number in England (see table A4).

A pupil-teacher ratio (ptr) aims to provide an estimate of the average number of pupils an individual teacher works with in an individual class. In January 2003, the pupil-teacher ratio in nursery schools in Greater London was 16.0, compared with an average of 16.4 for maintained nursery schools in England as a whole. The pupil-teacher ratio in maintained primary schools in Greater London was 23.3, which was higher than the average of 22.6 for maintained primary schools in England as a whole (see table 5). The average ptr for secondary schools in Greater London was close to that for secondary schools in England as a whole, at 16.9 and 17.0 respectively.

Pupil-teacher ratios in London's independent and maintained special schools were, at 10.2 and 5.9 respectively, substantially more favourable than those in maintained primary and secondary schools. The ptr in England's independent schools as a whole were, at 9.7, slightly more favourable than the London counterpart. In contrast, at 6.4, the ptr in English special schools as a whole was slightly less favourable than that for London special schools.

5 Class size

The class size tables in the briefing are for classes taught by one teacher. In January 2003, there were 17,260 primary classes in Greater London of 21-30 pupils, with a total of 473,020 pupils. Classes in this range accounted for 85 per cent of all primary classes in London, and pupils in those classes 87 per cent of all pupils attending primary schools in the capital. In inner London, 89 per cent of primary classes were in the 21-30 range, and catered for 92 per cent of inner London primary school children.

There were proportionally more primary classes in this range in London, with proportionally more pupils in them, than was the case in England as a whole. For England as a whole, 75 per cent of maintained primary school classes were for groups of 21 to 30 pupils. Seventy six per cent of primary pupils in England were in classes of that size. By contrast London primary classes were less likely than was the case nationally either to be small, with between 1 and 20 pupils, or large, with 31 to 35 pupils (see table A6).

Table A7 provides information for pupils aged 5 and 6, who are at key stage 1 (ks1). Of 8,050 ks1 class groups in London, 7,440 (92 per cent) were classes of 21 to 30 pupils. For England as a whole, 85 per cent of ks1 classes were in this range. Ninety five per cent, 206,000 of 216,910, ks1 pupils in Greater London were in classes of that size, compared with 90 per cent of ks1 pupils in England as a whole.

Average class size in inner London secondary schools was slightly above, and in outer London slightly below, average class size in maintained secondary schools in England as a whole. As with primary pupils, secondary pupils in London were more likely to be in classes of 21 to 30 pupils than was the case nationally. Fifty eight per cent of classes in maintained London secondary schools were in this range, compared with 55 per cent in England as a whole. Similarly, 68 per cent of London secondary pupils were in classes of 21 to 30 pupils, compared with 65 of pupils attending maintained secondary schools in England as a whole (see tables 8a and 8b).

The difference between the proportions of small classes of 1 to 20 pupils in London and in England were small. At 6 per cent of classes in London, compared with 8 per cent in England as a whole, London had fewer large classes of 31-35 secondary pupils.

6 Pupils entitled to free school meals (FSM)

In January 2003, 164,630 pupils, 26 per cent of all pupils in London's maintained primary schools were eligible for free school meals. The rate of FSM entitlement was more than twice as high in inner London primary schools than in English primary schools as a whole (37 compared with 17 per cent) Twenty four per cent of pupils in London's maintained secondary schools were eligible for FSM

compared with 39 per cent in inner London, and 15 per cent in English primary schools as a whole (see table A9).

FSM entitlement in maintained special schools was much higher than in either primary or secondary schools, both in London and in England as a whole. Fifty five per cent of pupils attending special schools in inner London in 2003 were entitled to free school meals, compared with 44 per cent in Greater London and 35 per cent in England (see table A9c).

7 Pupils with statement of special educational needs (SEN)

Relatively few pupils in London's mainstream primary and secondary schools have statements of special educational needs. In mainstream primary schools, Hammersmith and Fulham has the highest percentage (2.8) and Newham the lowest (1.2).

In maintained secondary schools, Tower Hamlets has the highest proportion (4.1 per cent) of children on roll with a statement of SEN, and Croydon and Kingston upon Thames the lowest proportions (1.3 per cent). By contrast, for special schools, that percentage only falls below 90 in Camden and Harrow.

The situation in London's Pupil Referral Units (PRU) is mixed. In Brent, Havering, Hillingdon, Kingston upon Thames and Sutton, no children attending have a statement of special educational needs. Conversely, 52 per cent of such children in Harrow, 35 per cent in Barnet and 32 per cent in Haringey do. There are clear differences in the ways in which pupil referral units operate in different LEAs. Independent schools are least likely to have pupils who have a statement of special educational needs (see table A10).

8 Pupils with English as an additional language (EAL)

In January 2003, the proportion of pupils in Greater London whose first language was known to be one other than English was much higher than in England as a whole. Forty nine per cent of the maintained primary roll in Inner London was made up of pupils whose first language was known not to be English. The equivalent figures for Greater London and for England as a whole were 35 and 10 per cent. Pupils in maintained secondary schools were slightly less likely to have a language other than English as their first language (see table A11).

9 Black and minority ethnic pupils (BME)

Compared with maintained primary and secondary schools in England as a whole, those in inner London have particularly high proportions of pupils with a black and minority ethnic heritage. In inner London 25 per cent of primary pupils of compulsory school age and above have a White British heritage. The equivalent figure for secondary schools in inner London is 27 per cent. In both maintained primary and secondary schools in England as a whole, that figure is 80 per cent.

While inner London primary schools have above average proportions of BME pupils in all categories, there is a particularly strong presence with a Black African (16 per cent of the roll), Black Caribbean (12 per cent) or Bangladeshi heritage (10.3 per cent). Pupils classified as 'any other White' form 9 per cent of the primary roll and include groups such as those with a Turkish Cypriot heritage. A similar proportion is present in inner London's maintained secondary schools (see tables A12 and A13). Using any reasonable measure, the evidence from maintained primary and secondary schools confirms the capital as a multi-ethnic city.

10 Permanent exclusions and pupil absence

In the primary phase, the provisional rate of pupil permanent exclusions is the same in inner London, outer London and in England as a whole (0.03 per cent). In the secondary phase, rates are above the national average in both inner and outer London, This is also the case in special schools. In inner London secondary schools 0.30 per cent of pupils were permanently excluded in 2001/2, compared with 0.29 per cent in outer London and 0.24 in England as a whole. In special schools, the equivalent figures were 0.50 per cent, 0.43 per cent, and 0.36 per cent (see table A14).

Tables A15a and A15b show the percentage of half days missed due to authorised and unauthorised absence in the 2002/3 school year. Authorised absence is absence with permission from a teacher or other authorised representative of the school. This includes instances of absences for which a satisfactory explanation has been provided (for example, illness). Unauthorised absence is absence without such permission. This includes all unexplained or unjustified absence.

6.4 per cent of all school half days (morning or afternoon sessions) were missed in Greater London primary schools. This was slightly lower than the 2001/2 figure of 6.5 per cent. However, at 5.8 per cent in 2002/3 and 5.9 per cent in 2001/2, absence rates in maintained primary schools in England as a whole were below those in London

In secondary schools, 8.2 per cent percent of half days were missed in Greater London in 2002/3, Again this was lower than in the previous year. It was also lower than the national secondary school absence rate of 8.3 per cent in 2002/3. In the previous year, the position was reversed – in Greater London 8.9 per cent of half days in secondary schools were missed with the comparable national figure 8.7 per cent (see table A15),

11 Attainment at key stages 1 to 4

Tables A16 to A20 show test results in each key stage over time.

Performance at key stage 1 in inner London has been below the national average in all but one of the years reviewed. In outer London, the percentage of pupils reaching nationally expected levels at the end of key stage 1 is below the national average, but less so than in inner London. In Greater London, 78 per cent of 7 year olds achieved Level 2 and above in reading in 1998. This increased to 81 per cent in 2003, In 1998, 79 per cent of pupils in Greater London achieved level 2+ key stage 1 in writing. There were improvements on this in the following four years, but in 2003 the proportion fell to 78 per cent. In mathematics, 83 per cent of pupils in Greater London achieved nationally expected levels in 1998. The equivalent figure for 2003 was 5 points higher at 88 per cent (see table A16).

Key stage 2 test results show a more pronounced pattern of recorded improvement over the period 1998 to 2003. In 1998, 64 per cent of 11 year olds in Greater London achieved Level 4 or above in ks2 English tests. That percentage increased to 75 per cent in 2003. Fifty six per cent of 11 year olds reached Level 4 or above in mathematics in 1998, and this also increased to 71 per cent in 2003. The recorded improvement in ks2 science tests in Greater London over the same period was even more pronounced, with an 18 percentage point difference between results in 1998 and 2003 (see table A17).

Key stage 3 results in London also record improvement between 1998 and 2003. Sixty two per cent of ks3 English test results were at level 5 or above in Greater London in 1998. The proportion reaching nationally expected levels in this test had risen to 65 per cent by 2003. Similarly, 52% of 14 year olds achieved ks3 tests in mathematics in 1998. This had increased to 67% in 2003. Science test results recorded a 13 percentage points increase over this period (see table A18).

In both key stage 2 and key stage 3, the percentage of pupils reaching nationally expected levels was generally marginally below the national average in all three subjects. The gap was greater for pupils at inner London schools in both key stages.

Tables A19 and A20 show public examination results, averaged for boroughs, between 1998 and 2003. The tables provide information for boys and girls separately. Table 19 shows the percentage of

pupils achieving five or more General Certificate of Secondary Education (GCSE) higher grade passes. Table 20 shows the percentage of pupils achieving no GCSE passes.

Girls aged 15 year olds performed consistently better than boys on the '5 A*-C' measure in Greater London. Forty eight per cent of girls achieved 5 or more GCSE higher grade passes in 1998. Thirty seven per cent of boys achieved this standard in the same year. The equivalent figures for 2003 were 56 per cent and 45 per cent.

While table A19 indicates a general improvement in the proportion of 15 year-old achieving 5 or more higher grade passes, Table 20 points to another feature of education in London. In both Greater London as a whole and in England as a whole, there has been relatively little change in the percentage of pupils achieving no GCSE passes. This core of under-achievement is larger amongst boys than amongst girls, but is present in both cases. There are also variations between individual LEAs. In Islington, the overall percentage of 15 year olds achieving no passes fell from 10 per cent of the roll in 1998 to 5 per cent in 2003. In contrast, in Haringey that percentage figure rose from 8 to 10 per cent over the same period.

Appendix 1: Notes on key reference tables

1 Inner London and outer London

Parts of London have been settled for some two thousand years. However, the boroughs listed as being in inner London are those which were largely built before and during the period of Victorian and Edwardian development which ended in 1914. While it has developments from that period, outer London was more exposed to housing development which took place after 1914.

2 Types of school

Unless specified otherwise, tables are for the maintained sector and do not include independent schools. Maintained schools are funded through local education authorities (LEAs), and include community schools, voluntary controlled schools, voluntary aided (mainly church) schools, and foundation schools. LEAs are the admissions authorities for community and voluntary controlled schools. Voluntary aided and foundation schools are their own admissions authorities. City technology colleges and academies are registered as independent schools, but are funded largely by central government. Direct grant schools, similarly, are funded by central government.

Otherwise schools are divided into nursery, primary, secondary and special schools. LEAs also maintain pupil referral units (PRUs). In England, education is compulsory for children between the ages of 5 and 15. In London many LEAs also provide full-time education in reception classes from 1 September in which a child reaches the age of four. Nursery schools are for children who have not yet reached compulsory school age or the age when they would normally enter a reception class. Nursery provision is also provided in nursery classes within primary schools.

Primary schooling is provided in infant, junior and junior and mixed infant (JMI) schools. Depending on whether they also have nursery classes, infant schools cater for children who are aged between four and six at the start of the school year. Junior schools cater for children aged between seven and ten at the start of the school year. JMI schools cater for pupils aged between 4 and 10 at the start of the school year. Most secondary schools in London admit pupils aged 11 at the start of the school year, and also provide post-compulsory education in sixth forms.

Middle schools include pupils at the upper end of the primary age range and the lower end of the secondary age range. Depending on which group predominated, the Department for Education and Skills classified middle schools as either middle deemed primary, or middle deemed secondary. Harrow is the only LEA in London to retain middle schools.

A pupil referral unit is any centre maintained by an LEA and attended by pupils who, because of exclusion or other reasons, are not able to attend a maintained school. Special schools educate children with special education needs who cannot be accommodated in mainstream schools.

Independent schools are not, except in the case of city technology colleges and academies, funded by the state.

3 Local education authorities shown in the tables

Local education authorities are responsible for securing a sufficient number of school places to meet demand from within their area. In London, the 32 London boroughs are, with the Corporation of London, also LEAs. The tables in this briefing include information on the number of schools maintained by each London LEA and on the number of pupils and teachers in those schools. They refer to where pupils attend schools, rather than to where pupils live.

Independent schools are grouped in terms of the location of their administrative base.

4 Teachers and pupils included in the tables

Figures for teachers and pupils are from an annual headcount taken on the third Thursday of each January. In this briefing the figures are for January 2003. Figures for teachers refer to teachers in post, including supply and relief teachers covering vacancies. Unfilled vacancies are not included in the tables.

Some teachers work part-time, and possibly in more than one school. The ratio of hours worked to a notional full-time working week of 32.5 hours is used to calculate full-time equivalent (FTE) teacher numbers in these cases. The same formula is applied to part-time pupils, for example pupils attending nursery classes on a part-time basis.

A pupil-teacher ratio is the ratio of the total number of children to the total number of teachers in a school or area.

5 Class size

Class size figures are a snapshot of the situation in schools taken at a designated point in the day. The exact time when the snapshot is taken varies between schools. The classes recorded should be typical of arrangements for that time in other weeks in the school year. However there may be anomalies in the tables if classes are not otherwise brought together are normally merged at that time, for example for PE.

6 National curriculum and key stages

The national curriculum must be delivered in all maintained schools over 11 years. From Year 1, when children are usually 5 at the start of the school year, to Year 11. This is the final year of compulsory schools, which pupils enter when they are 15. The national curriculum is organized in 4 'key stages'. Key stage 1 is for pupils aged 5 and 6 at the start of the school year, and who are in years 1 and 2 of the national curriculum, Key stage 2 is for pupils aged 7 to 10 at the start of the school year, who are in years 3 to 6 of the national curriculum. Key stage 3 is for pupils aged 11 to 13 at the start of the schools. For the majority of pupils, key stage 4 culminates in public examinations at the end of secondary schooling.

Assessments in key stages 1 to 3 are in terms of 'levels', which are intended to reflect the extent of learning. Children are expected to move up through these levels as they pass through the school system and learn more. Typically, children are expected to move up by 1 level over a two-year period.

At the end of key stage 1, the majority of pupils are expected to have reached level 2 of the national curriculum. The national expected levels for pupils at the end of key stages 2 and 3 are levels 4 and levels 4 or 5 respectively. Pupils are assessed through a combination of teacher assessments of pupil achievement made of the course of time, and through tests.

Public examinations pre-date national curriculum tests. The majority of pupils now take GCSE (General Certificate of Secondary Education) examinations at the end of compulsory schooling. A minority take other public examinations. The tables provide combined information on results in GCSE examinations and equivalent results in other types of public examination.

7 Free school meal entitlement.

Pupils are entitled to free school meals where parents receive Income Support payments. Free school meal entitlement therefore can be used as a measure of poverty.

8 Special educational needs

Children have special educational needs if they are of compulsory school age and have a learning difficulty which calls for special educational provision. A learning difficulty involves a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of children of the same age. It may also involve a disability which prevents or hinders children from making use of educational facilities normally provided for children of the same age in the same LEA. It is currently intended that children's special educational needs should as far as possible be made within and by mainstream schools. However, in some cases teachers and the LEA may conclude that a child's special educational needs cannot be met from within the resources available to a school. A formal assessment of whether this is so may lead to a statement of special educational needs being issued. Where a statement is issued, the LEA has a duty to arrange for type of education the child needs to be provided.

9 Children's first language

This is the language to which the child was initially exposed during early childhood. Current information lists this as 'known or believed to be English' or 'known or believed to be other than English'. Information is not currently collected nationally on the specific languages spoken or on the level of fluency in English of pupils who speak a language in addition to, or other than, English.

10 Ethnicity

The categories used reflect, but are not identical to, those in the 2001 Census. They do not match fully the categories used in earlier schools surveys to record the ethnic groups of pupils.

11 Pupil absence

Pupil attendance at school is registered at the start of the school day, and again at the start of the afternoon session. The school day is therefore divided into two sessions. Absence in either counts as a half day's absence. Absence in both, counts as two half day absences.
