

The 2008 election results summary



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2008 Election results summary

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Summary


- The turnout for the Mayoral election was significantly higher at 45.3 per cent compared with 36.9 per cent in 2004 and 34.4 in 2000. There were over 2.4 million valid first choice votes.
- Boris Johnson of the Conservative party had the highest proportion of first choice votes at 43 per cent, followed by Ken Livingstone with 37 per cent.
- The Conservative candidate had an increase in share of first choice votes from 2004 of 14.1 percentage points, while the Labour and Green candidates both slightly increased their share and all other parties, which competed in both years, lost share.
- After second choice votes are included, the Conservative candidate increased share from 44.6 per cent to 53.2 per cent between 2004 and 2008. Ken Livingstone's share fell from 55.4 per cent to 46.8 per cent.
- In terms of the total proportion of second choice votes (whether they counted towards the final Mayoral result or not), Brian Paddick received by far the highest proportion of votes (32 per cent), followed by Siân Berry (17 per cent), then Ken Livingstone (15 per cent) and Boris Johnson (13 per cent).
- The eight Assembly constituencies where Boris Johnson has the highest percentage of votes were all won by the Conservative candidate, while the other six were won by Labour.
- The Conservatives had 36.7 per cent of the Assembly Constituency vote up from 31.2 per cent in 2004. Labour candidates took a 27.5 per cent share up from 24.7 per cent in 2004.
- The only change in winning party from 2004 was in Brent and Harrow, which was a Labour gain. The Conservatives had gained the same constituency from Labour in 2004.
- In the Assembly London-wide election, the Conservative party gained the highest share of the vote in the list election with almost 35 per cent of the total, an increase from 28.5 per cent in 2004. Labour came second with 28 per cent, up from 25 per cent in 2004, followed by Liberal Democrats with 11 per cent down from 17 per cent in 2004.
- The list elections added 3 more Conservative and 2 additional Labour members to the Assembly as well as 3 Liberal Democrats, 2 Greens and 1 BNP. The BNP secured 5.4 per cent of the vote, up from 4.8 per cent in 2004. No other parties gained the 5 per cent required for a seat on the Assembly.

Turnout

The turnout for the Mayoral election was significantly higher at 45.3 per cent compared with 36.9 per cent in 2004 and 34.4 in 2000. This represented an additional 552,000 valid votes from 2004. The total electorate was 5,419,913, which was up from 5,197,792 in 2004, a four per cent increase. There were over 2.4 million valid first choice votes and over 2 million valid second choice votes. There were around 41,000 rejected first choice votes and 412,000 rejected second choice votes (See Appendix Table 1). There were also over 13,000 blank votes where no vote at all was cast, though these are not included in the turnout figures.

The turnout was highest in Bexley and Bromley at 49.9 per cent and lowest in City and East at 39.8 per cent (Map 1), though even this is higher than the 2004 average. Turnout increased in every constituency with the largest increase in Croydon and Sutton (11.4 percentage points), and the smallest in Brent and Harrow (5.2 percentage points).

2008 Mayoral election results

The Mayoral and Assembly Elections took place on 1st May 2008. The election was based on the Supplementary Vote System whereby voters are to mark the ballot paper with a first choice candidate and then, if they wish, to indicate a second preference. The first choice votes are counted and if one candidate has over 50 per cent of the vote (absolute majority), he or she is elected. If no one has achieved this then the second choice votes are considered. Only the top two candidates go forward and all the second choice votes for these two candidates from the eliminated candidates are added to their total. The candidate with the most votes is declared the winner.

In an election notable for a much-increased turnout, no candidate gained 50 per cent of the first preference votes. Boris Johnson of the Conservative party had the highest proportion at 43 per cent, followed by Ken Livingstone with 37 per cent (Figure 1 and Appendix Table 2). For the Conservative candidate, this represented an increase in share over the 2004 result of 14.1 percentage points. The Labour and Green candidates also increased their share, but only by 0.2 and 0.1 percentage points respectively. All the other parties that competed in both elections, lost share, with the Liberal Democrats and UKIP having the biggest falls (Table 1). The only other party to increase their number of votes was the BNP, though its share still fell by 0.2 percentage points, due to the high turnout.

Figure 1 Total proportion of first choice votes





Once the second preference votes were added to the two top candidates, Boris Johnson received almost 1.2 million votes, which represented 53.2 per cent of the vote. This compares with the Conservative (Steven Norris) share in 2004 of 44.6 per cent (and represents more than half a million votes more than in 2004) and 42.1 per cent in 2000 (Figure 2). Despite losing, Ken Livingstone had increased his number of votes from 828,390 in 2004 (over 200,000 more votes), though partly due to a high turnout, it still meant his share of the vote against the Conservative candidate fell from 55.4 to 46.8 per cent (Table 2). Boris Johnson's majority over Ken Livingstone after second choice votes was 139,640, which represents just six per cent of the total valid first choice voters.

Figure 2 Trend of proportion of votes for top two candidates 2000-2008





Boris Johnson received the highest number of first choice votes in 8 of the 14 constituencies, while Ken Livingstone was top in the other 6. Boris Johnson 'won' in Bexley and Bromley (61 per cent), West Central (56 per cent), Havering and Redbridge (53 per cent), Croydon and Sutton (49 per cent), South West (48 per cent), Ealing and Hillingdon (46 per cent), Barnet and Camden (46 per cent) and Merton and Wandsworth (46 per cent). Ken Livingstone received the most votes in City and East (52 per cent), Lambeth and Southwark (49 per cent), North East (49 per cent), Greenwich and Lewisham (43 per cent), Brent and Harrow (43 per cent) and Enfield and Haringey (42 per cent). Boris Johnson won constituencies mostly in the suburbs while Ken Livingstone did better in Inner London. The exceptions were the closely fought constituencies of Enfield and Haringey and Brent and Harrow, which were both edged by Ken Livingstone. Boris Johnson also won the West Central constituency (Map 2).

The biggest margin of victory was in Bexley and Bromley where Boris Johnson polled 60 per cent of the vote compared with Ken Livingstone's 20 per cent. The voting was closest in Brent and Harrow where Ken Livingstone received 43 per cent to Boris Johnson's 40 per cent (Figure 3).

Unsurprisingly, Bexley and Bromley was also won with the largest majority, where Boris Johnson polled more than 81,000 votes more than Ken Livingstone, while the majority for the latter was just over 4,000 in Brent and Harrow (Table 3).

Map 2 Party with the most Mayoral election first choice votes by constituency










Boris Johnson was strongest in West Central and Bexley and Bromley (Map 3), while Ken Livingstone was strongest in City and East, Lambeth and Southwark and North East (Map 4). Brian Paddick (Liberal Democrats) had his strongest results in Lambeth and Southwark and the South West (Map 5), while Siân Berry (Green) had her best results in Greenwich and Lewisham, Lambeth and Southwark and the North East (Map 6).


Map 3 Percentage of votes for Boris Johnson




Map 4 Percentage of votes for Ken Livingstone



Map 5 Percentage of votes for Brian Paddick




Map 6 Percentage of votes for Siân Berry



There were 2,004,834 voters (83 per cent) who recorded a second choice vote.

In terms of the total proportion of second choice votes (whether they counted towards the final Mayoral result or not), Brian Paddick received by far the highest proportion of votes (32 per cent), followed by Siân Berry (17 per cent), then Ken Livingstone (15 per cent) and Boris Johnson (13 per cent) (Figure 4).

Assembly Constituency results

These results mirrored the Mayoral voting, in that the eight constituencies where Boris Johnson has the highest percentage of votes were all won by the Conservative candidate, while the other six were won by Labour. Overall, the Conservatives had 36.7 per cent of the vote (over 900,000 votes), compared with 27.5 per cent for Labour candidates. The Conservative and Labour shares had increased from 31.2 per cent and 24.7 per cent respectively in 2004. The UKIP and Liberal Democrats saw the biggest falls in share, dropping by 7.1 and 5.0 percentage points respectively. The largest share achieved by one candidate was in West Central constituency where Kit Malthouse (Conservative) polled over 52 per cent of the vote (Table 5). In three constituencies the minor parties gained more than 10 per cent of the vote. They were City and East, where Respect (14 per cent) and BNP (10 per cent) gained substantial numbers, while in both Bexley and Bromley and Greenwich and Lewisham, National Front (6 per cent) were prominent. No other minor party gained more than 5 per cent of the vote in any constituency. The numbers of votes for all candidates are listed in Appendix Table 4.

In almost all cases where one of the two leading parties won the seat, the other party came second. There were two exceptions, in Lambeth and Southwark where the Liberal Democrats came second to Labour and in the South West where they came second to the Conservatives.

The largest majority again was in Bexley and Bromley where the Conservatives held a 75,237 majority, while the closest fought seat was in Enfield and Haringey, where only 1,402 votes separated the top two candidates and Joanne McCartney (Labour) won with 32.5 per cent of the votes (Table 6). Nine of the fourteen winning candidates are the same as in 2004.

The only change in winning party from 2004 was in Brent and Harrow, which was a Labour gain. The Conservatives had gained the same constituency from Labour in 2004. Each winning candidate, whether Conservative or Labour, increased their share of the vote from 2004, with the only exception being Brent and Harrow. The biggest improvement of share was seen in Havering and Redbridge, where the Conservative candidate increased their share by 14 percentage points. Labour's biggest increase was in the North East where they improved by 10 percentage points. These increases meant that the majorities in most of the constituencies increased. Other than Brent and Harrow, the only area not to have an increase in majority was Enfield and Haringey which fell by 172 (Table 7).

Assembly London-wide election

The list election is used to top up the constituency seats to make a total of 25 members. It is used to provide proportional representation to the Assembly. Therefore 11 seats are distributed using the modified d'Hondt formula (See footnote on Appendix Table 3 for a brief description of this method).




Figure 5 Share of votes for Assembly London wide members election




Figure 7 Change in percentage point share of Assembly London-wide vote 2004-2008

There were a total of 2,412,607 votes cast. With around 836,000 votes, the Conservative party gained the highest share of the vote in the list election with 34.8 per cent of the total, an increase from 28.5 per cent in 2004 (Figures 5 and 6). Labour were second with 28 per cent (665,000 votes), up from 25 per cent in 2004, followed by Liberal Democrats with 11 per cent down from 17 per cent in 2004. This fall for the Liberal Democrats meant a loss of two Assembly seats. The Green Party share (8 per cent) was about the same as 2004. The only other party to gain more than the 5 per cent of the vote required for a seat on the Assembly was the BNP with 5.4 per cent, up from 4.8 per cent in 2004. In 2004, the UKIP share of the vote was 8.4 per cent and this fell to just 1.9 per cent in 2008, meaning a loss of their two seats (Figure 7).

The 'other' parties totalled 12.5 per cent and that breaks down by party as The Christian Choice 2.9 per cent, Abolish the Congestion Charge 2.6 per cent, Respect (George Galloway) 2.5 per cent, UK Independence Party 1.9 per cent, English Democrats 1.1 per cent, Left List 0.9 per cent, Unity for Peace & Socialism 0.3 per cent, Independent 0.2 per cent and One London (Leader Damian Hockney) 0.1 per cent.





All constituencies had the same winning parties as the Mayoral and the constituency elections. Furthermore the second placed party was almost the same as the constituency elections. The only exception was Lambeth and Southwark, where the Conservatives came second, rather than the Liberal Democrats.

The list elections added 3 more Conservative and 2 additional Labour members to the Assembly as well as 3 Liberal Democrats, 2 Greens and 1 BNP. Since 2004, the Liberal Democrats have lost 2 seats and UKIP (One London) lost two, while the Conservatives gained three seats and BNP gained one. When added to the constituency seats Conservatives had the most seats (11), followed by Labour (8), then Liberal Democrats (3), Green (2) and BNP (1) (Figure 8).


Six of the list members were also elected four years ago while five are new members. Overall there are 10 new members on the 25 seat Assembly.

NB. The 11 list seats were determined using the modified d'Hondt formula. Only parties with at least 5% of the vote can win a seat. In the London elections the first round starts by dividing the votes by the number of seats already won in the Constituency election, plus one. So the Conservative vote was divided by 9 as they won 8 seats while the Labour vote was divided by 7 as they won 6 seats. The results of this calculation are examined and the party/candidate with the highest number wins the seat. The process is repeated until all seats have been allocated, with, at each round, the parties votes being divided by the number of seats they have already gained in both Assembly elections plus one, and the party or candidate with the largest result from this calculation gaining the next seat.
